Motion by Hickey, seconded by Uhl, that same be granted, and that the Mayor be and is hereby directed to endorse the approval of applicant's bond. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote hereon was as follows: All ayes.

The following Resolution was introduced by McCarville and read:

Whereas, Hugh O. Benson has made application for an off and on sale beer license, and all respects in legal and due form, and notice of hearing thereon has been given according to law, by publication in the Frontier, and

Whereas, no remonstrances are interposed, and no objections are on file or made to the granting of said application and issuance of license for off and on sale of beer, to said applicant.

Now therefore, be it resolved, that the Mayor and City Council of O'Neill, Nebraska, that an off and on sale beer license be granted to said Hugh O. Benson, and that the City Clerk be and he hereby is directed to issue said license in manner and form and within the time as prescribed by law.

Motion by Ray, seconded by Uhl, that the above resolution be adopted. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote thereon was as follows: All ayes.

Ordinance No. 241a was introduced by Hickey and read for the first time. Motion by McCarville, seconded by Uhl, that Ordinance No. 241a be passed on its first reading. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote thereon was as follows: All ayes.

Motion by Ray, seconded by Hickey, that the rule that the ordinance be read on three different days be suspended. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote was as follows: All ayes.

Ordinance 241a was by title read the second time. Motion by McCarville, seconded by Uhl, that Ordinance No. 241a be passed on its second reading. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote was as follows: All ayes.

Ordinance No. 241a was then read at large. Motion by Ray, seconded by Hickey, that Ordinance No. 241a be passed on its third reading. Roll was called and the vote was as follows: All ayes.

Motion by McCarville, seconded by Uhl, that Ordinance No. 241a be passed and adopted. Roll was called on the above motion and the vote was as follows: All ayes.
