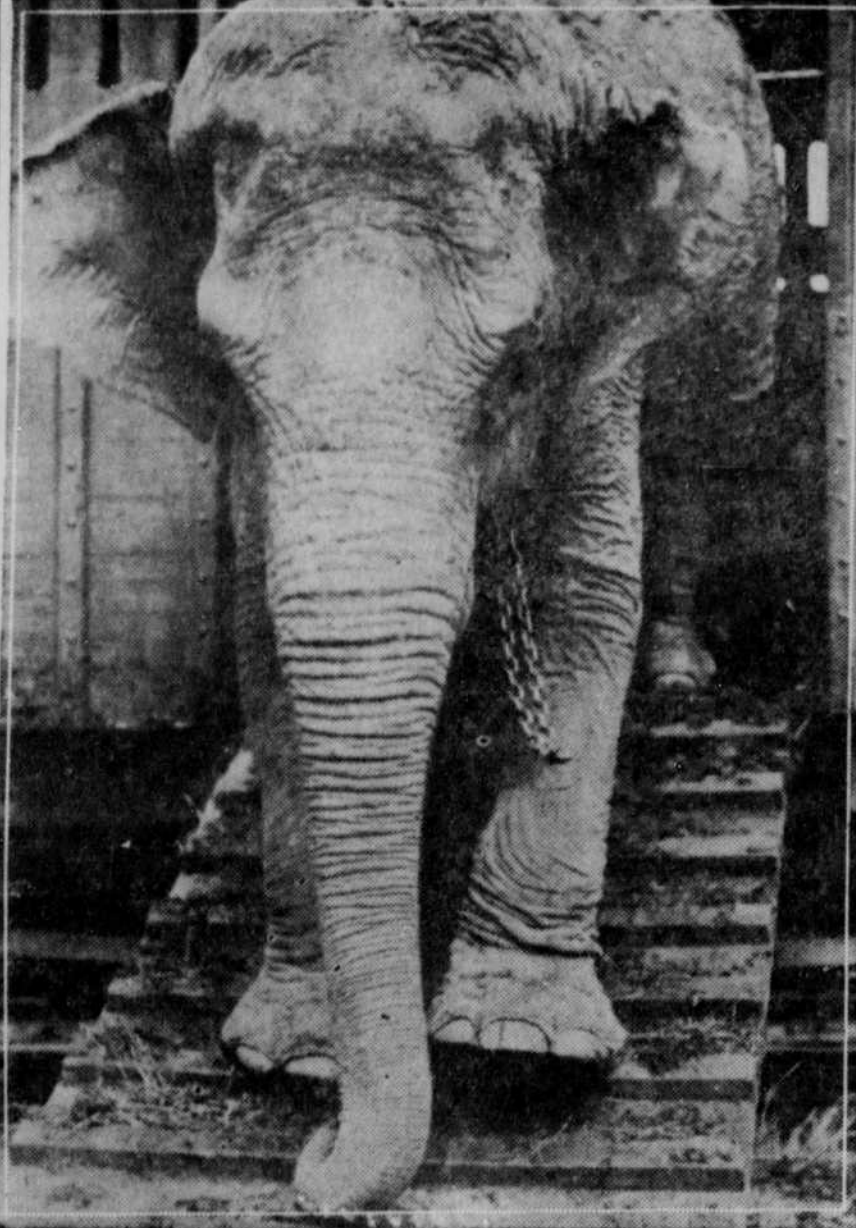

214 MILES REA
LINES PROPOSED

Chambers, Amelia, Dustin, Atkinson, Coleman Areas in Plan

A contract has been let to the Omaha Contractors, Ltd., to construct 214 miles of rural electrification line in Holt county, according to Edward Wilson, manager of the Niobrara Valley Electrical Membership corporation here.

Work will not get underway until the contract has been approved. Wilson stated that it usually takes nearly three weeks for an approval of this type to be returned from REA headquarters in Washington.

However, the Omaha company will be ready to go as soon as the contract is approved, Wilson explained.

The 214 miles of REA line will be principally in three segments. The South segment will be from O'Neill to Chambers to Amelia. The West segment will take in the O'Neill to Atkinson to Dustin areas, with the third

segment reaching North from O'Neill to the Coleman and Saratoga areas.

The contract was let Friday by the directors, who met here to discuss the bids that had been received.

Arrangements have been completed for the shipment of line poles that will begin rolling in to O'Neill in about two weeks at the rate of one carload per day.

Operations will begin at O'Neill and branch out to the segments as the work progresses.

At the present there are approximately 700 Holt county applications on hand for REA service Wilson concluded.
