Fredrickson's Cattle Market Higher

Six hundred twenty cattle and 30 hogs were sold Thursday at the Fredrickson livestock commission company here.  
 All classes of cattle were absorbed at prices fully steady to 75 cents to one dollar higher.  
 Most good steers sold from \$20.50 to \$22 with the common to good kinds bringing \$19 to \$20.50. Most heifers sold from \$17.50 to \$19 with the choice light weights bringing a dollar more.  
 Fat cows sold for \$14 to \$15.50, per hundred weight.  
 Some choice calves brought \$25, mostly \$22.50 to \$24.  
 In the hog market, hogs sold easily with a top of \$21. One hundred and eighty to 200 pounders cleared at \$20 to \$21.50; 200 to 270 pounders brought \$21.50 to \$21.50. Light sows, 330 pounds down, sold for \$18.50 to \$20.50, with the heavier kinds \$16.50 to \$18.50. Some 500 and 600 pound sows brought down to \$14.50.

CAPITOL NEWS

**LINCOLN**—Gov. Val Peterson this week had press and personnel problems. Really, it was all one problem.

It began several days ago when The Lincoln Journal remarked in an editorial that State Resources Division Director Allen Dowling's job had been offered to another man, and it was refused.

Two days later Dowling announced his resignation, effective when a successor had been chosen.

"Reports now published suggest the advisability of releasing this statement," he said. The Journal quoted Rufus Howard, director of agriculture, and Dowling's superior, as saying the former Lincoln, Omaha and Beatrice newspaperman was fired.

The governor, who had asked the legislature for a big increase in the resources division appropriation, said he "regretted" Dowling's resignation. "I think he has done an outstanding job in establishing the division," the governor said.

Meanwhile, the Nebraska press carried an "it was learned" story saying that Dr. Byron H. Baer, 54-year-old Ashland physician would soon be announced by the governor as the successor to Dr. W. S. Petty as state health director.

Dr. Baer later said he had not yet decided whether to take the position and would not comment until he had talked with the governor.

At his press conference, Gov. Peterson declined to discuss the matter beyond saying the \$5,500 a year job still is open.  
 Dr. Baer, a graduate of the University of Nebraska medical college, has been practicing at Ashland since September, 1931.

It was evident to reporters that the governor was miffed at the press' handling of both the Dowling and Baer stories. And statehouse observers are well aware that the chief executive prefers to release any appointments or resignations from his office, rather than have them appear first in the papers.  
 The Nebraska farm council, sponsors of referendum petitions opposing increased motor vehicle registration fees, lost only 7,630 signatures through invalidity, a check of the petitions by the sec-

retary of state's staff showed. This left 37,048 signatures, well above the 23,817 required to place the issue on the 1950 ballot.

Checking was not complete at week's end on petitions opposing the penny-a-gallon gasoline tax increase.

George Morris, superintendent of the Nebraska state reformatory for men, had some things to say in his biennial report to the board of control.

"There is a very strong indication that the greatest drawback to parole in Nebraska at the present time," he said, "is a lack of supervisory personnel. This same lack of personnel can be found in the supervision of individuals placed on probation by the courts."

The reformatory superintendent urged, "in every judicial district a probation officer of the highest type, paid an adequate salary to insure that supervision is carried out in the best way possible, as intended by law."

Morris attacked the present system as inadequate. He said an individual cannot be paroled to a community without its first

agreeing to participate in the parole plan. It is essential, he said, that an institution accept the responsibility of developing the necessary contact in the community to insure acceptance of the individual.

State Treasurer Edward Gillette reported that the state had a cash balance of \$12,492,505 on August 31, from current revenue funds, excluding \$1,625,031, in outstanding warrants.

Henry Bartling, secretary of the state board of agricultural lands and funds, said Nebraska received \$113,251 from July 1, 1948 to August 15, 1949, from leasing oil, gas and agricultural rights to 61,320 acres of state-owned school land.
