It began several days ago when The Lincoln Journal remarked in an editorial that State Resources Division Director Allen Dowling's job had been of-fered to another man, and it was refused.

Two days later Dowling an-nounced his resignation, effective when a successor had been chosen.

"Reports now published sug-gest the advisability of releasing this statement," he said. The Journal quoted Rufus Howard, director of agriculture, and Dowling's superior, as saying the former Lincoln, Omaha and Bea-trice newspaperman was fired.

The governor, who had asked the legislature for a big increase in the resources division appropriation, said he "regret-ted" Dowling's resignation. "I think he has done an outstanding job in establishing the division," the governor said.
