There are 31 pupils in kindergarten and first grade; 32 in the second and third grades; 33 in the fourth and fifth; 21 in the sixth and 32 in the 7th and 8th grades, a total of 149. There are 91 in the high school — 21 freshman; 25 sophomores; 24 juniors and 21 seniors.

Music courses are being offered as a part of the high school curricular here for the first time in a number of years.

Approximately 30 students have registered for band, 30 for Girl's Glee club and 50 for the mixed chorus.

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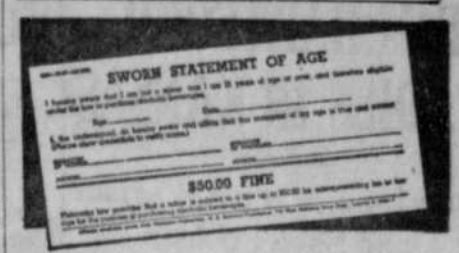

Nebraska law requires that retailers refuse to sell beer to anyone under 21.

It is to the tavern owner's credit that, when in doubt, he does not sell.

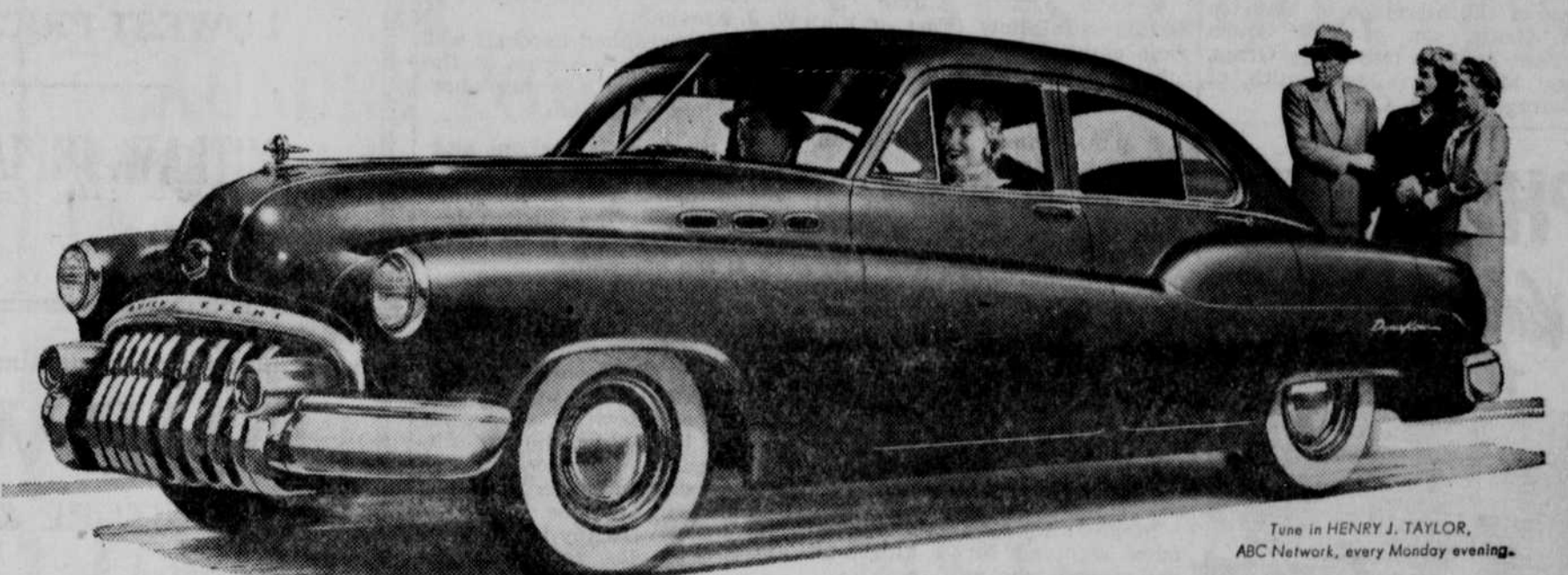
To protect him against age misrepresentations, he is provided with "Sworn Statements" which doubtful cases must sign before making a purchase. Minors who falsely swear they are 21 years of age or over are subject to a \$50 fine.

You Are Urged To Help Your Retailer

Do not ask him to sell beer contrary to law. And do not object when he insists upon proof of age. He is merely being a good citizen by operating his business legally and in the public interest.
