



It is to the tavern owner's credit that, when in doubt, he does not sell.

To protect him against age misrepresentations, he is provided with "Sworn Statements" which doubtful cases must sign before making a purchase. Minors who falsely swear they are 21 years of age or over are subject to a \$50 fine.


