

CARDS TO LINCOLN EAGLES DROP FOR GRID OPENER STARTER, 24-0

St. Mary's Cardinals will have three strikes against them when they open the 1949 grid season come 8 p.m. Friday.

1. They will be tackling one of last season's leaders in six-man prep grid circles—Cathedral high of Lincoln.
2. They will enter the fray with what appears to be a dubious air attack.
3. They will be spending most of the day on the road enroute to the Lincoln grid—some 225 miles distant.

But despite these odds, the Cards polished-off their stiff rehearsals Wednesday and prepared to give their parochial opponents a battle royal.

The Card coaches, Rev. C. J. Werner and Jack Arbuthnot, are not enthusiastic over the St. Mary's aerial department. The team lacks height and a first-class pitcher.

On the ground, however, the outlook is different.

Probable starters for the Cathedral game are: Pat Hickey and Jack Gatz, ends; Hank Mangan, center; Shorty Miles and John Uhl, halfbacks; and Jerry Wills, quarterback. All are letterman.

Others who'll probably get the nod to make the trip are: John O'Neill, Jack Carney, Larry Krysl, Connie Murphy, Eddie Tomlinson, Jim Kelly, Don Becker and student Manager Fritz Flood.

PLAINVIEW—An air-minded Plainview club scored once in each quarter to down the O'Neill high school Eagles, 24-0, in the season's opener for both teams played Friday night on the Plainview grid.

In the first quarter the Plainview club scored on a pass play with about three minutes remaining.

During the second canto another pass netted six points. An end sweep paved the way for the third period score with the final six points being chalked up, when the Eagles attempted to execute a flat pass play. The pass was intercepted and the Plainview end went all the way for the score.

However, the Eagles were inside the Plainview 5-yard line three times, and were on the 1-yard line when the final gun sounded.
