Cattle Market Brisk At Fredrickson's

Seven hundred fifty - seven cattle and 400 hogs were sold Thursday, September 29, at the Fredrickson Livestock Commission company here. The cattle market was strong and brisk with many buyers for all classes. Some two-year-old 900 pound steers brought \$20.50 with yearling steers selling from \$19.50 to \$21.70. Yearling heifers sold for \$17.50 to \$19.50 while steers calves brought \$22 to \$25 with heifers calves around \$20 to \$22.50. Some young breeding cows went at \$15.35 with fat cows selling \$16 and down. Cannery and cutters sold from \$10.50 to \$15 with bulls selling mostly for \$15 to \$16.

Top butchers brought \$19.30, mostly \$19 to \$19.25 with light sows bringing up to \$18.75, mostly \$17 to \$18.50. Feeder pigs sold for \$20 to \$23.50.
