

### Fund Hits Top

Angus breeder, was first to be introduced. He had consigned a registered Angus heifer. As names were called the donors were asked to stand.

J. D. Cronin, O'Neill attorney, was introduced and discussed briefly the room memorial plan. He told the audience that room memorials were being sold for \$1,000 each. He pointed out that the \$1,000 not only purchased the room essentials, such as beds, furniture, linens, etc., but the money would help to equip the hospital.

Cronin explained the plaque memorial method. Inscriptions on the plaque will be left to donor's discretion.

Mr. Cunningham presided as room memorial pledges were made. Among donors whose names were announced were: Mrs. Mary Corke, of Tilden, in honor of her husband, (father of the drive chairman); Mrs. James M. Corke, Lloyd Collins, R. G. Shelhamer, Biglin Bros., L. D. Putnam, D. C. Schaffer, and M. B. Higgins.

Auctioneers James G. Fredrickson, of O'Neill, and Ed Thorin, of Chambers, were introduced.

An hour-long auction was begun. First property sold was a 22x28-ft barn and a 12x30-ft. chicken house on the hospital building site.

A baseball autographed by Connie Mack, "the grand old man of baseball", went to Ben Gilligan for \$50.

Football autographed by Frank Leahy, a native O'Neillite and now director of athletics at University of Notre Dame, were sold to Mrs. W. J. Froelich (2), Mrs. E. M. Gallagher, Mrs. Joseph Gallagher, Rt. Rev. J. G. McNamara, C. V. Sullivan and Fred Saunto.

They brought \$85 each and in several instances were turned back to be resold. The balls bore Leahy's autograph as well as signatures of Notre Dame players.

Mr. Leahy had also forwarded autographed photographs. They sold to: Miss Bee Gallagher, \$40; Paul Beha, \$30; G. E. Miles, \$15; Ray Bohn, \$12; Russell Shoemaker, \$10; Miss Helen Gallagher, \$10.

A stack of hay donated by Evert Miner went to Gene Wolfe for \$8 per ton.

A nanny goat dubbed "Pluto" made a comic entrance onto the stage, escorted by a clown. She went on the auction block and netted St. Anthony's \$654.

Other purchases for lesser amounts were Bernard Allen, John Donlin and Mr. Corke. L. C. Walling, treasurer, made a financial report, which showed until then \$103,140.70 in Holt county banks.

The fund was swelled \$2,000 by the announcement from Commander Gordon O. Harper, of Simonson post 93, that the Jubilee-Festival netted that amount, which included float prize money turned back by winners. The Legion auditorium was

decorated in Autumnal colors. Crepe paper on the fluorescents subdued the lighting.

In a brief remark, Mr. Thorin, who is mayor of Chambers, told the audience that the campaign had been a "wonderful job well done."

Vern A. Pangborn, director of the division of hospitals of the Nebraska department of health, lauded the drive. He said that Nebraskans are using general hospitals at the rate of "one hospital day per person per year."

He also pointed out that "Nebraskans used 300 thousand general hospital days last year at an average cost of \$10.50 per day."

Mr. Pangborn said that the state department of health was "happy to be a small part in the excellent O'Neill program."

Mr. Cunningham closed the 3 1/2-hour dinner meeting by saying:

"This demonstration we have seen in behalf of St. Anthony's hospital leaves us with a firm conviction of American unity for a good cause."

Thus concludes the first—and most important—phase in the St. Anthony's hospital program. The original plan specified a 300-thousand-dollar hospital covering the cost of physical construction. Of this amount, 100-thousand-dollars was to be raised by popular subscription, the federal government would match that amount, and the Sisters of St. Francis, who will own and operate the hospital, were to assume "any reasonable indebtedness."

Approximately 40 thousand-dollars is needed to equip the hospital and already room memorial sales are underway.

Pledge cards have been printed and a plan is arranged whereby donors may make three installments over a period of three years. These gifts are deductible from income tax.
