

Cardinals Smother Marty Mission 62-0

EWING SWAMPS O'NEILL, 31-0

Coach Marvin Miller's Eagles Drop Third Grid Start

Capitalizing on O'Neill fumbles and by virtue of successive end sweeps and off-tackle plays, the Ewing Tigers powered to a 31-0 victory over the O'Neill high school Eagles here Friday night before a celebration crowd of approximately 1,800 fans. The game was played in a 35-mile-per-hour wind.

The Ewing Tigers were never in danger and scored in three of the periods.

Jack Pruden, the Tiger full-back, scored four of the five touchdowns and did the lion's share of the line battering.

Ewing took the opening kickoff and after rolling up five successive first downs, Pruden hit pay dirt from two yards out. The plunge for the point after touchdown was good.

The Tigers kicked out-of-bounds and the Eagles took the ball on their own 40-yard line.

After a series of thrusts over tackle and guard, Calkins booted to the 9. But the Tigers were guilty of being offside and the Eagles accepted the penalty and made their initial first-and-ten on the midfield stripe.

After Layh had gained six yards through the center of the Tiger forward wall, Wagon took a pitchout lateral from

Calkins and made another first-and-ten on the Ewing 30-yard line.

The drive died and the Tigers took over on their own 27.

With a series of end sweeps and off-tackle power plays the Tigers were on the O'Neill 21 as the first quarter ended.

On the second play of the second canto, Pruden fumbled and Porter, the Eagle pivot, recovered on the O'Neill 18.

With four yards to go on fourth down, O'Neill elected to run the ball. The Ewing forward wall rose to the occasion and swamped the Eagle tail-back at the line of scrimmage and the Tigers took over on their own 48-yard-line.

On the next five out of six plays, Sanders, the Tiger quarterback, ripped the ends and tackles for the second TD. The plunge by Cloyd for the point was short.

An Eagle fumble on the second down following the kickoff was recovered by the Tigers as the first half ended.

The score: Ewing 13, O'Neill 0.

Late in the third period Layh fumbled on the O'Neill 36-yard line and as the third quarter gun sounded, the Tigers were on the one-foot line.

Pruden bulled over right guard for the score on the first play of the fourth quarter. The plunge for extra point was short.

Another fumble by O'Neill was recovered by Ewing on the first play after the kickoff.

After recovering the fumble on the 24-yard line, Sanders powered his way to the 19. Pruden ripped off tackle to the 15 and on the next played ploughed his way to the 11 for a first-and-10.

Pruden, two plays later, went over his own right tackle from the two for the score.

A pass this time for the extra point, from Sanders to Dierks, failed to hit its mark and fell incomplete in the end zone.

The final six points came after an O'Neill man touched the kickoff. Ewing recovered on O'Neill's 31.

Sanders plowed for four yards after a pass to Bennet had failed. Then Sanders took to the air lanes again and hit Charvat on the 10 and he stumbled to the

Pruden, unofficially, scored 24 of the 31 points tallied during the tilt.

Butte will face Lynch Friday, October 7, on the gridiron here.

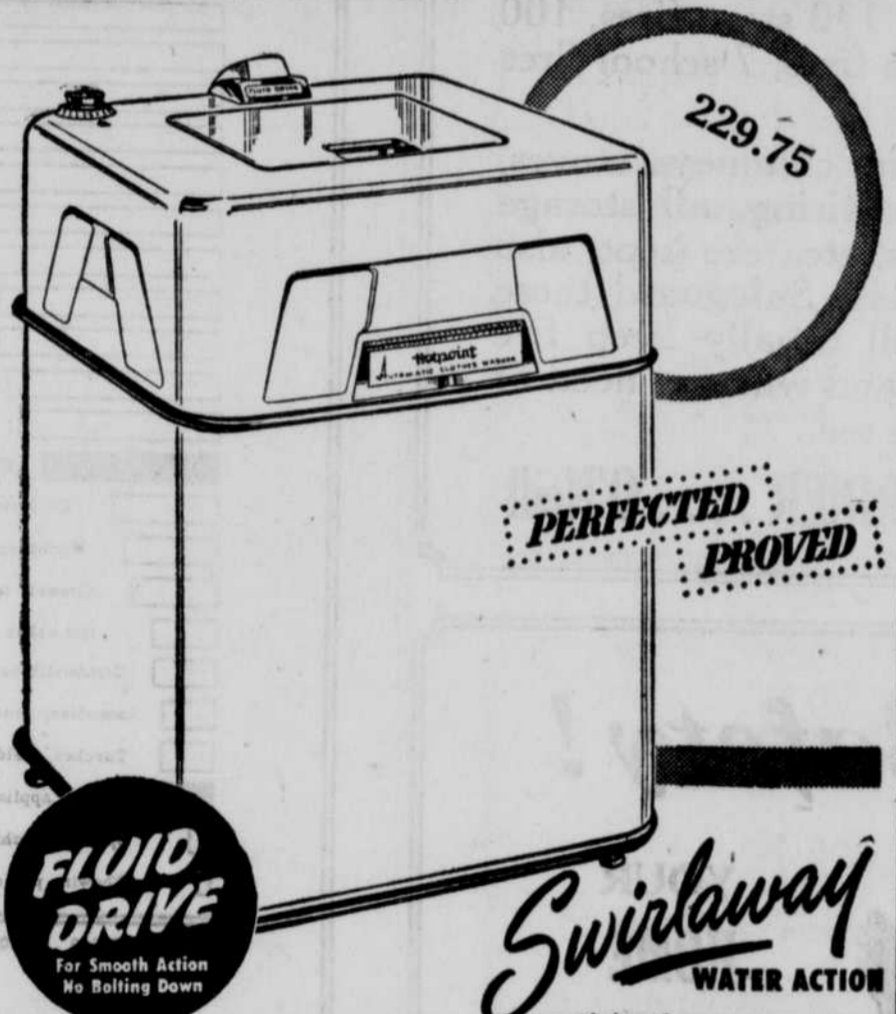

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St. Mary's Crew Scores At Will Against Dakota Indians

In one of the highest scoring six-man football contests in the history of the academy, St. Mary's scored at will over the last Thursday afternoon. Final score: 62-0.

Coach Jack Arbuthnot said the score indicated the pattern of the game. All 12 of the boys who made the trip saw plenty of action. "Marty simply did not have the manpower to manifest an offense or a defense," Coach Arbuthnot commented.

Coach C. J. Werner credited "Shorty" Miles with scoring five touchdowns, two field goals and two points after touchdown. Miles' total was 36 points.

Other scorers were the Cardinal halfback, John Uhl, who collected two six-pointers, and Wills, the quarterback, one touchdown. Henry Mangan, the pivot man for St. Mary's, tallied a six-pointer with Krysyl grabbing a pass for a point after touchdown.

Last week prior to the contest, the Cardinal coach anticipated a tough game with the Indian school.

The enrollment of the Marty Mission is 483 students.

Nevertheless, Coach Werner said the Cardinals looked definitely improved on defense, both passing and on the ground, and it gave the team an ideal chance to polish its ground offensive.
