Attends State CROP Planning Conference

ATKINSON—Rev. I. G. Ihrig, of Atkinson, district director of the Christian Rural Overseas Program (C R O P), convened October 6, with other state district directors in a major preliminary event in the 1949 program at Lincoln.

The meeting, which was presided over by Chancellor R. G. Gustavson of the University of Nebraska, featured Dean Emeritus Burr, of the college of agriculture. Dean Burr spoke on his recent agricultural work in Europe.

During the afternoon session district CROP directors met in a planning conference with Dwight Dell, state director of the program.

The Atkinson clergyman headed last year's CROP drive for the six-county area, which includes Holt. Ten carloads of relief products were contributed by residents as a direct gift to Europe's needy in 1948.

When You and I Were Young — Hazelett and Meals Back from Klondike, Expect to Return Next Spring

50 YEARS AGO
October 5, 1899

Harvey Herbert Bently died Wednesday, October 4, at 9:30 a.m. at the home of his parents in this city. For the past three years he had been employed as bookkeeper for the William Krotter Co. at Stuart, but lately was forced to resign on account of failing health and went to Long Pine with the hopes of rest and returning strength, but he became worse and last Thursday returned to his parent's home in this city. The deceased was born in Floyd county, Ia., on December 24, 1870, and removed to this county in 1884. He was a graduate of O'Neill high school having graduated from that institution June 29, 1888.

Cheve Hazelett and Jack Meals returned last week from the Klondike county after an absence of a year and a half. They succeeded in locating several claims in the Copper river country and expect to return next Spring and work them.

Some of the claims are very promising and the boys expect to make a good stake next trip.

25 YEARS AGO
October 9, 1924

Miss Teresa Hayden, in company with her mother and brother were returning from Stuart in their Chevrolet touring car and were traveling at a reasonably high speed last Sunday evening. They were thrown into a panic when a jack rabbit jumped through the windshield and landed in Miss Hayden's face, breaking off four teeth. The rabbit fell between the seats, dead. Miss Hayden is a member of the high school faculty.

Herman Petak died in the Lynch hospital last Thursday. He was born in Germany and was about 61-years-old. He has been in America for the past 34 years. The remains were brought to O'Neill and services were held at St. Patrick's church Thursday morning. Burial was made in Calvary cemetery.

Stanley Soukup will open up a confectionary, short order and soft drink room in Joel Parker's new building near the city hay market Saturday, October 11. The new place will be known as the Crystal cafe. The large residence South of the Venus school house in Knox county burned last Saturday morning about nine o'clock. F. M. Sparks, 86, Succumbs

Funeral services for Ferdinand M. Sparks, 86, were held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the chapel of the Seger funeral home in Atkinson, Nev. Roy M. Wingate, of Inman, officiated at the rites and burial was in the Ewing cemetery.

The late Mr. Sparks died Wednesday evening, October 5, at an O'Neill hospital. He had been ill approximately six weeks.

A pioneer settler, Mr. Sparks was born in Ohio, April 1, 1863, and came to Holt county in 1895.

He settled in Eastern Holt county, but recently he was an O'Neill resident. During most of his life however, he was a resident of the Ewing and Inman communities.

A son, Vernon, of Amelia, is the lone survivor. At the funeral rites a quartet, composed of George Mentzer, Gilbert Schneider, Robert Horner and Donald R. Davis, sang and Bonnie Humphrey was the pianist.

Schaffer Calves Gain 1.92 Pounds Per Day

At a recent calf show in connection with a Golden Jubilee celebration at Schleswig, Ia., Miss Marie Wollenhaupt, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Wollenhaupt, of Schleswig, won top honors. Her four calves were picked for grand championship, and in individual showing, one of Marie's calves also was awarded the championship. As a prize she will receive a steer calf, the pick of the Dewey Schaffer & son ranch near O'Neill.

The 181 calves shown at the show were purchased from the Schaffer ranch and taken to Schleswig, October 17, 1948, where they were sorted and divided into 38 pens of five calves each and distributed to 43 boys and girls in the Schleswig community.

In 320 days of feeding the boys and girls fed their calves for an average rate of gain of 1.92 pounds per day for a total gain per calf of 614.5 pounds. The average feed cost per head for the entire group was \$12.50. The total investment

of the project including original cost of calves and feed costs for the 320 days of feeding amounted to \$36,829. The calves sold September 10 for \$48,949 leaving a net profit of \$12,120 for the entire group of calves. The average net profit per calf for the 181 head was \$66.96.
