Columbus Day was made a legal holiday by an act of the lature, approved by Gov. Chester H. Aldrich, April 7, 1911. The bill, S. F. 201, was introduced by Democratic Sen. J. H. Buhrman of St. Libory, a farmer and banker representing what was then the 17th senatorial district.

The bill occasioned little if any discussion, and made its way through the legislature in routine fashion and with but slight opposition. Indeed, the first general discussion of the whole matter seems to have occurred on October 12, 1911, when Nebraskans, much to their surprise, found their banks and public offices closed for the


