

St. Mary's Romps Past Crookston, 58-0

Cards Meet David City Crew Friday in Crucial Test

The offensive minded, latent powered St. Mary's academy Cardinals made it three wins in a row in as many starts Friday afternoon when they breezed by inexperienced Crookston, 58-0, on the loser's gridiron.

Shorty Miles and John Uhl hit pay dirt four times apiece and each took credit for two points after touchdown. Wills tallied the other six-pointer.

Early in the first period, Miles, the able St. Mary's half-back, got the scoring underway when he swept his own right end for 25 yards and the initial TD.

Midway in the second period, Miles plucked off a Crookston aerial and ran down the sidelines for another tally.

He repeated his interception performance during the third quarter, but this time he was only 30 yards away from the double stripe.

The halftime score was St. Mary's 34 Crookston 0.

During the last half of the tilt, Cardinals substitutes carried the load and all 11 men who made the trip saw plenty of action.

Assistant Coach Jack Arbutnot summed the game up this way: "The Crookston game was an ideal warm up contest for the Dwight Assumption game coming up Friday, at David City. The Cardinals had the experience and too much power for Crookston."

St. Mary's blocking and was crisp, but the passing was kept to a minimum by the cool temperatures and a very strong wind.

The Cardinal and White of St. Mary's looked "impressive" on the ground both offensively and defensively, Rev. C. J. Werner, the coach said.

This week in the Cardinal camp, Coach Arbutnot has been polishing the air offensive and at the same time the pass defense was being overhauled.

According to some observers, weather permitting, the passing could be the deciding factor in the game with David City crew.

Dwight Assumption at David City, unofficially, is rated fourth in the state in six-man football circles.

When the Cardinals and White trip to David City they will be laying on the block a record of three straight 1949 wins against no losses.

Arbutnot said early this week, "We'll (the Cardinals) make the David City boys know they've been in a ball game!"

The Ewing touchdown came in the second quarter when Pat Sanders, the Tiger field general, ripped off eight yards for the six-pointer.

For the point after touchdown, Sanders faked back and rifled a spot pass to Dierks, an end, who was in the end zone. The completed pass spelled victory for the undefeated Tigers.

The Hay Balers' counter came in the fourth period on a pass play that covered 56 yards.

A forward-lateral pass — Small to Stowell to Frisch — made up the scoring combination.

The Tigers intercepted the Hay Baler forward pass for the attempted extra point that meant defeat for the Atkinson club, its fourth in a row.

Ewing played the first half minus the services of its full-back, Jack Pruden, and the last half without Sanders.

With the soggy field and the wet ball, both teams made numerous fumbles and the passing was ineffective, except for the forward-laterals that resulted in the Atkinson tally.

CREIGHTON DROPS O'NEILL, 24-6

Wagon Intercepts Pass and Scores O'Neill's Lone Marker

The O'Neill high school Eagles dropped their fourth football game in a row Friday night at Creighton, 24-6, before 500 rain-coated spectators.

In losing the fourth contest, the Eagles managed to hit the scoring column for the first time during this season.

The Creighton "11," with a halfback by the name of Gensler, went whizzing around the O'Neill ends like "greased lightning" and when the first-half gun sounded Creighton was in front, 12-0.

O'Neill took the opening kickoff of the second half and on a sustained march down the field, got within six inches of the double stripe but the Eagles were unable to punch across the leather.

The host's took over on their own 6-inch-line.

On the first play, Creighton booted out, but the play was recalled as an Eagle player was offside.

On the following play, Gensler, started running wide around his own right end, cut in sharply over tackle and went 95 yards for the third quarter score.

Midway in the third period, Wagon, the Eagle wing-back, intercepted a Creighton pass on Creighton's 40-yard line and raced for O'Neill's only tally thus far in the 1949 season. Don Caulkins, the Eagle fullback, bulled his way over guard for the extra point.

Gensler, of Creighton, is the best back the O'Neill team has had to contend with thus far in the season, Eagle Coach Marv Miller said. End sweeps were a Gensler "special." Aided by poor end play for the Eagles, it was easy for the Creighton flash to "buzz" the ends.

Outstanding, both on defence and offense for the O'Neill cubs, were Don Caulkins and Don Wagon.

Friday, October 14, the O'Neill "11" will play at Ainsworth.

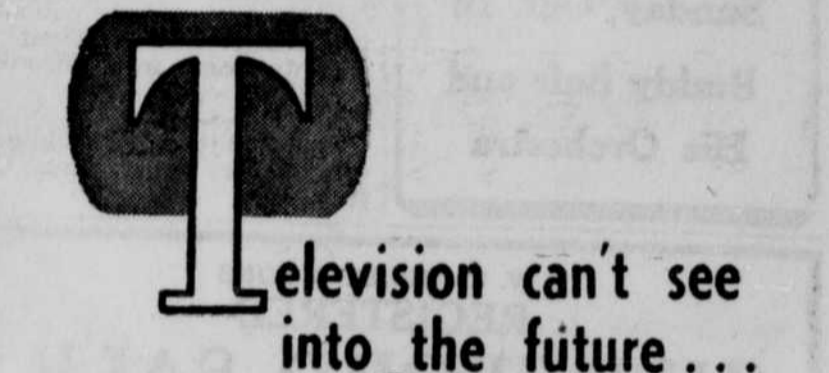
