Insurance Dividends for Dead Vets' Beneficiaries

Kieth A. Abart, Holt county service officer, announced Monday that widows and beneficiaries of deceased World War II veterans are entitled to a dividend of the special GI insurance "kitty," even though when the veteran died the insurance was not in force.

If the veteran died and his insurance was not in force, but at one time had GI insurance, the beneficiaries should address a letter to: Death Claims Service Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C.

The letter should contain a death certificate showing the date of the veterans death, veterans full name, date of birth, service serial number or numbers and applicant's address.

Proof of the right to the claim will be determined by the veterans administration after the facts of the case have been assembled and investigated.

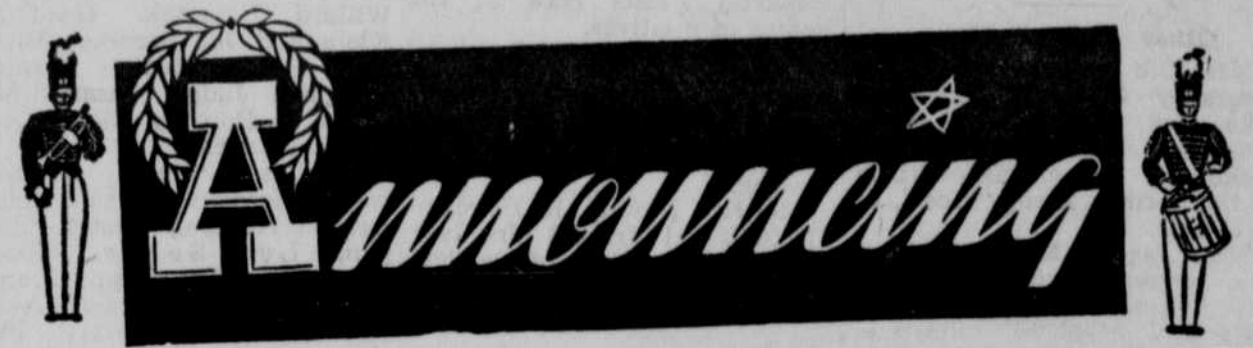
A simple letter stating the claim due the beneficiary, the relationship to the deceased veteran, and the applicant's signature should be included.

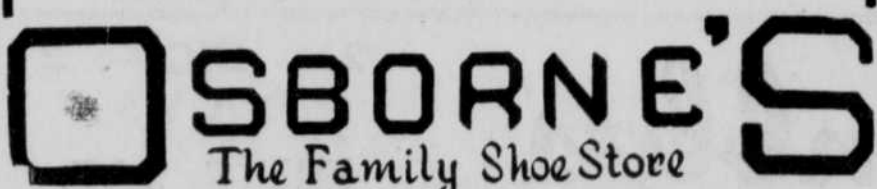
