77 Truckloads of Calves Await Space

ATKINSON—That the Atkinson Livestock Market is now coming into its peak season was evident Monday as 77 trucks of calves for which pens were not available until after the sale started were lined up from the pavilion to about two blocks North of the O.K. Inn. Over 6,500 stocker and feeder cattle were consigned for sale.

Three thousand calves, 85 percent of which were Herefords, made up the largest single group. There were also 1,500 yearling steers, 650 yearling heifers, 225 head of breeding cows, 500 2-year-old steers and 1,000 head of cattle, all classes.
