

CARDS DISPOSE OF LYNCH, 46-0

Shorty Miles Racks Up 28 Points in Lopsided Victory

St. Mary's academy Cardinals continued along their victory route here Friday night at Carney park. They romped to an easy victory over Lynch high school, 46-0.

It was the fifth straight win of the 1949 season for Jack Arbuthnot's Cardinals. In rolling up 46 points, Shorty Miles, the Cardinals' outstanding halfback, figured in five of the seven touchdowns. When the final gun sounded, Miles had racked up 28 points.

Lynch was completely outclassed in every department and had trouble mustering one drive in the third period. A few plays after the opening kickoff, the Cardinals diagnosed the Lynch "Y" formation and from then on successfully bottled up the visitors' plays.

St. Mary's kicked off to Lynch to get the game underway and after several running plays, the visiting team fumbled on the Lynch 38 and St. Mary's recovered. In three punches at the line, the Cardinals picked up a first and 15 on the Lynch 23. Willis faded back on the next play and rifled a pass to Mangan, on the 6-yard-line, who went over for the initial counter. Miles' dropkick for the point after touchdown hit the goal post bar and bounced back.

The kick off rolled out of bounds between the 15-yard-line and Lynch put the ball in play on their own 30.

After several tries at the line and ends, Lynch punted the ball in play on the academy 30. John Uhl passed to Jack Gatz on the midfield stripe and he wiggled his way to the Lynch 30 before being hauled down. Willis fumbled the leather on the Lynch 28 and the visiting team recovered.

The Cards pushed the visitors back to the 25 and they were obliged to punt again. Uhl took the boot on his 29 and returned it to midfield. Willis pitched a lateral to Miles on an end-around play which netted 19 yards. The pigskin was on the Lynch 21 when the first quarter ended. The score: St. Mary's 6, Lynch 0.

After two plays and an off-side penalty, Miles bulled his way over the double stripe from 11 yards out for the second counter. A high pass from center nullified Miles' attempted dropkick for the extra point.

Lynch fumbled two plays after the second period kickoff with Gatz recovering on the Lynch 17 for the Cards.

On the third play after the

recovery, Miles jump passed to Uhl in the end zone for the third touchdown. The pass intended for Hickey for the PAT was incomplete. Score: St. Mary's 18, Lynch 0.

Lynch, unable to get the leather over the 13-yard-marker after the kickoff, booted to Willis on the Cardinal 30. As the St. Mary's field general was crossing the Lynch 33, he slipped to the turf.

Two completed passes and two line bucks later put the pigskin on the Lynch 1-yard line. Miles carried the mail over his right side for the TD and his dropkick for the conversion was blocked. Forty-five seconds later the first half gun sounded.

Lynch kicked off to St. Mary's to open the third quarter. Uhl took the boot on his 10 and got back 13 yards to the Cardinals 23. Unable to gain, Miles punted and Lynch mustered its only drive of the game, 46 yards.

The drive began on the Lynch 9 with a spread pass play, which was completed down the center for 10 yards. Lynch in a punt formation passed and it took the leather into Cardinal territory on the 39-yard-stripe. Bobby Speltz exploded through the line on a delayed play and went for seven yards. Speltz again went through the line to the academy 25, the farthest point of penetration. Speltz lateraled to the Lynch halfback on the next play, who was hit on the Cardinal 31. Gatz intercepted a desperation Lynch pass, ending the drive on the Cardinal and White 27.

An end sweep by Uhl for the Card's put the ball on the 30 but the academy was guilty of clipping, which took the ball back to the Cardinal's 15.

Miles took the ball on the next play, started wide around his right end, cut in reversed his field twice, and scampered 65 yards to tally standing up. Miles flipped an aerial intended for Hickey for the PAT but it fell incomplete.

On the first play following the kickoff, Speltz, Lynch's right half, fumbled at midfield and Mangan recovered for the St. Mary's "6".

Uhl then picked his way behind good downfield blocking to the Lynch 28. Lynch was offside on the next play which gave the Cardinals and White a first and 15 on the Lynch 21 as the third canto ended.

Lynch took the ball on their own 17 four downs later.

With three punches at the line, the Lynch "6" booted to the Lynch 30. It was a 15 yard kick.

Miles gained a yard over his right side, then went through the center of the Lynch forward wall to the nine yard stripe where Uhl on the next play powered over for the sixth tally. Miles' dropkick was good for PAT.

The Cards kept the Lynch team deep in the visitor's territory after the kickoff. Lynch booted to their own 30 where Uhl took the punt on the dead run and went down the North side lines to the Lynch 3 before being hauled down.

Miles ripped through the center of the line for the final score of the game and his dropkick for the extra point split the uprights.

Friday, October 28, the St. Mary's "6" takes on Sacred Heart, of Norfolk, at Carney park under the lights here.

Tilden Tallies Through Air

EWING — Unofficially, Pat Sanders, gained 222 of the Ewing Tigers' 383 total yards Friday night at Tilden as the Tigers accounted for victory number six. Ewing defeated Tilden, 20-6.

On the fifth play from scrimmage after the opening kickoff, Sanders ripped over the double strip for the initial counter from 18 yards out. The try for the extra point was no good. The score culminated a 54-yard drive.

Jack Pruden, the Tiger fullback, took over the scoring reigns, and hit pay dirt later in the first quarter. The plunging fullback also took credit for the extra point. The score at the end of the first quarter, Ewing 13, Tilden, 0.

A barrage of Tilden passes hit the Ewing secondary during the second period and Tilden managed its only score of the game.

James hit McKnight with an aerial on the Ewing 34 and McKnight raced down the sidelines for the score.

The Tigers made another TD in the second canto when Pruden ripped over from nine yards out, and plunged for the point after touchdown. That wound up the scoring of the tilt.

The Ewing club played a the second half as Tilden cos-defensive ground game during the second half as Tilden connected with five out of 16 attempts.

Kurgeweit looked the best in the Ewing line while Sanders was easily the outstanding back on the field.

The second stanza was scoreless. Battle Creek had possession of the ball long enough to run only 11 plays in the first half. Ewing racked up 200 yards from rushing during the first half compared to Battle Creek's 63.

Midway in the third Pruden slanted off-tackle for 38 yards and a touchdown. The extra point try failed.

The Braves then moved into gear. They plowed to the Tigers' 17 where Freudenburg skirted end for 17 yards and six points. The kick was wide.

In the fourth, Freudenburg and Rodekoer hammered at the Tigers' line and Rodekoer bounced across from the 5. The all-important extra point try was no good.

Reports from returning weekend nimrods said duck hunting was "particularly good" in Holt counties. But for those journeying to other counties for pheasants the reports varied.

Lawrence Hamik, of Stuart, assistant Holt county sheriff, told The Frontier Monday that on the first day of the duck season—Friday—he bagged his limit within 2½ to 3 hours. He was hunting South of Stuart in the lake country. Hamik said he had seen "quite a number" of mallards and some geese in the Dora lake country. Hamik also observed a number of out-of-town cars in the region South of Stuart.

Melvin Ruzicka, O'Neill businessman, reported Monday he shot three ducks in the Chambers region Sunday afternoon. However, Ruzicka said, the water fowl were a "little" wild after two days of bombardment.
