

UNIFIED WORSHIP PLAN TO BEGIN

Atkinson, Stuart Churches
to Experiment in 1½-
Hour Service

ATKINSON — A new unified service which combines morning worship and Sunday-school into a single continuous worship period will be inaugurated at the Atkinson and Stuart Presbyterian churches on Sunday, November 6, for a 3-months trial basis, it has been announced by the pastor, Rev. Orin C. Graff.

Purpose of the new procedure will be to unify the worship services of the church and to correlate them into the home worship of the families. Trial of a single service to be one and one-half hours in length was prompted by the apparent division in thinking of most persons in regard to the Sunday-school and church, Reverend Graff said.

Miss Helen Larson, a sister of Mrs. Graff, has been hired as church secretary, and a specific duty of hers will be to edit a weekly church paper, MimeoGraff, in which will be carried the order of Sunday services and suggested family worship references to fit into the Bible study of the following Sunday.

Miss Larson came to Atkinson from Sioux City where she has been employed by International Harvester company.

At Atkinson when the new type service gets underway, church will start at 10:55 a.m. and will continue until 12:30 p.m. The first portion of the service will be devoted to song service, prayer, special music and reading of the scripture. This same scripture will be studied during the second phase of the worship, and the expository type sermon will be based on this same scripture during the third portion of the service, Reverend Graff explained.

Contributing still further to the understanding of the scripture for any given week will be the fact that families have based home worship on this same part of the scripture, having obtained their references from the MimeoGraff, the pastor explained.

"Breaking away from the conventional 1-hour Sunday-school followed or preceded by an hour of morning worship should accomplish several things," explained Graff. "We will be able to unify the program in scripture, offerings (there will be just one offering and one budget) and provide a
