

## NEWMAN GROVE TO TEST TIGERS

Win Would Cinch Loop  
Title for Strong  
Ewing Team

EWING — The Ewing high school Tigers lead the Cornbelt conference with a perfect record to date. Only one conference tilt remains. Newman Grove will entertain the Ewing club on Friday, November 4. A win will give Ewing the title.

The Ewing club, under the direction of Coach O. D. Smith, has established an enviable record during the past two seasons. The Tigers have played the last 14 games without a defeat.

In seven straight wins this season they have rolled up 2,252 yards and 151 points to their opponents' 783 yards and 24 points.

Jack Pruden, senior full-back, leads the scoring with 69 points. Pat Sanders, a senior halfback, has 47; Jack Charvat, a junior back, 12; Dave Cloyd, a senior back, 12; Mert Dierks, a senior end, 4 and Jim Good, a freshman back, 1.

Sanders has chalked up a total of 854 yards in six games to lead in the ground-gaining division. This is 71 yards more than all of the opposing teams have gained during the season. Cloyd has piled up 859 and Pruden 645.

Highlighting the line play has been the outstanding performance of Jerry Rotherham, a junior, who plays center. Jerry has played a full 60 minutes in every game this season and has yet to make a bad pass-back. Eugene Kurgeweit, a senior tackle, has played outstanding football all season. He has been a power in the Ewing defense during every game.

The final game of the season will be played on the home field on Friday, November 11, when the Tigers meet Plainview in an afternoon game.

## Cardinals Rout Sacred Heart

Visiting Coach Calls It  
Quits in 4th Period  
With Count 76-0

Coach Jack Arbuthnot's St. Mary's academy Cardinals continued in the unbeaten six-man football ranks Friday night at Carney park as they blasted Sacred Heart, of Norfolk, 76-0.

When the score mounted to 76, the visiting team called it quits with three minutes to go.

The visitors penetrated, entirely through the air, to the host's 36-yard line on one occasion before losing the ball. It was the farthest advance into St. Mary's territory during the entire contest.

On the first play from scrimmage, following the opening kickoff, Miles blasted through the center of the line for 49 yards and the initial counter. Miles' dropkick for the extra two points was good and the score read: St. Mary's, 8; Sacred Heart, 0. About 90 seconds had elapsed in the first period.

After four stabs at the line Sacred Heart's attempted boot was blocked on the Cardinal 39-yard line.

The blocked kick was recovered by Sacred Heart, but it was a fourth down punt and the ball automatically became St. Mary's.

On play number one following the blocked kick, Wills, on a fake hand-off into the line, dropped back and shot a pass down the center to Miles who powered straight ahead over the double stripe for the second score. Miles' dropkick split the uprights for another two points and the score was: St. Mary's, 16; Sacred Heart, 0.

Sacred Heart's Danny Yochum took the kickoff on his own 10 and got back 11 yards to his 21-yard marker.

Again Sacred Heart took to the air and Shorty Miles intercepted a pass on the first play. The ball was on the Sacred Heart 29.

Uhl hit the left side for 12 yards and Wills ran to his left for 6 yards. The leather was on the 9-yard-line. Miles, on the next play, went through center for the third TD. The pass from Miles to Hickey for the extra point was good and the score stood at 23.

The kickoff was fumbled on the Norfolk 10 but it was picked up and returned to the Norfolk 18.

Two passes that didn't connect and a misplaced lateral

cost the Norfolks possession of the ball. St. Mary's recovered the misplaced lateral-pass on the visitors' 18-yard stripe. On the first play after the recovery, Miles jump-passed to Hickey in the end zone for another six-point.

On the play Hickey out-jumped a 6 foot 3 inch defender for the pass. Miles droppicked the extra points and the score was St. Mary's 32.

Danny Yochum picked the kickoff up from the turf on his own 10 and got back to the Norfolk 28 before being hauled down by a host of Cardinal tacklers.

On the first scrimmage play Miles intercepted a pass on the Norfolk 36 and got back 5 yards to the visitors' 31. Miles shot a pass to Hickey that was broken up as the first period ended.

St. Mary's fumbled the pigskin on the first play of the second quarter and the visiting club recovered.

Three passes later Mangan, the Cardinal pivot man, partially blocked a Sacred Heart punt. The Cards put the ball in play on their own 39.

John O'Neill, a substitute halfback, took a handoff from the quarterback and raced 41 yards for another score. The pass was complete for the extra point.

Score: St. Mary's 39; Sacred Heart 0.

St. Mary's took over after recovering a Sacred Heart fumble on the O'Neill 31. The visitors had driven from their own 12-yard-line to the Card 39 before fumbling. Following an offside penalty, the St. Mary's sextet shifted heavy left and John O'Neill took a lateral and went all the way down the North sideline for another TD. The extra point pass was good.

Three incomplete passes later Sacred Heart attempted to punt but it was blocked and a Cardinal back fell on the pigskin on the Sacred Heart 29.

Wills completed a pass to O'Neill for 10 yards as the first half ended. Score: St. Mary's 46; Sacred Heart, 0.

Sacred Heart fumbled on the first scrimmage play of the third canto and it was recovered by the host team. On the third play after the recovery, Gatz on a double reverse went wide around his right end for 17 yards and a score. However, it was called back because the Cards were offside. Wills followed it with a touchdown pass to Miles from the Norfolk 22.

Miles' dropkick split the uprights and the count was St. Mary's 54, Sacred Heart 0.

Later in the third period, O'Neill intercepted a Norfolk pass on the midfield stripe and behind perfect downfield blocking, he went the route for another tally. Miles converted and the count was St. Mary's 62, Sacred Heart 0.

As the final period was getting underway, Sacred Heart punted to John O'Neill who took the boot on the 9 and raced 71 yards for a score only to have it nullified by a holding penalty on the Norfolk 36-yard-line.

It was here that Coach Arbuthnot's pupils were forced to punt when the drive bogged.

Arbuthnot sent his "first" team back in and immediately Miles intercepted a pass on the Norfolk 30. He reversed his field once and went over the double stripe standing up for another six pointer. His dropkick for the goal was good.

Score: St. Mary's 70; Sacred Heart 0.

The unbeaten Cardinal six recovered a Sacred Heart fumble on the visitors' 23 to set up the final lally.

Wills dropped back and rifled a pass to Gatz in the end zone for the final score. A pass intended for Hickey for the point after touchdown was incomplete.

As the teams were lining up for the kickoff, the Sacred Heart coach called his boys off the field.

The Cardinals take on the Spaulding academy at Spaulding Friday, November 4.

## STUART DRUBS O'NEILL, 25-0

Bunny Seger Does Yeoman  
Job for Broncos  
In Win

STUART — The Broncos of Stuart high school trounced the O'Neill Eagles Wednesday afternoon, October 26, here, 25-0.

The game was marked by frequent penalties and Eagle Coach Marvin Miller estimated the Eagles were set back 250 yards.

The initial period between the rival ball clubs was scoreless as the teams saw-sawed back and forth on the gridiron.

But early in the second period, Bunny Seger skirted the O'Neill right end for the first six points. The conversion attempt failed.

Following the kickoff, the Eagles were unable to puncture the Stuart forward wall so Caulkins punted. A Bronco drive developed, that was set up by a 15-yard pass to C. Campbell. Jim Chaney went over for the second Bronco TD with 15 seconds remaining in

the first half.

Early in the third canto, Caulkins, booted from his 25 to Seger, who returned the punt for the third Stuart score. The score: Stuart 18; O'Neill 0.

The final TD for the host team came in the last three minutes of play.

After failing to gain, Caulkins again booted to elusive Seger who got back five yards. Two completed passes later Charles Chapman pulled down a pass in the end zone for the tally. Seger's conversion was good.

The final score: Stuart 25; O'Neill 0.

The Eagle coach said his team blocked a punt in the third period and before the Eagles could put the ball in play it was on the Eagle 15-yard marker. The blocked kick was recovered by an O'Neill player on the Stuart 15, the coach said.

The O'Neill high school Eagles will play host to Neigh, Friday November 4, when they go into action on the Carney park gridiron. The game is scheduled to get underway at 8 p. m.

Miller said he thought the Neigh battle would turn into the best Eagle contest of the 1949 season. This, he said, is because both the Eagle and the Neigh teams are on the same par with each other.
