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MSGR. McNAMARA DIES AT LYNCH

Ten years he attended a country school near Wisner and on February 2, 1885, he entered Guardian Angels' parochial school at West Point. It was the school's opening day.
He spent three years at Guardian Angels, going on to St. Francis Solanus college at Quincy, Ill., where he spent five years studying a classical course.
The college, the Monsignor often recounted, was then operated by monks and was attended by men only. Since it has been redesignated as Quincy college.

From Quincy the late Monsignor McNamara went to Mt. St. Mary's of the West, at Cincinnati, O., where he was in seminary training for the ensuing five years.
On March 4, 1897, he was ordained at Duchesne in Omaha. He said his first Mass at West Point on March 9, 1897.
His first clergy appointment was at Sacred Heart church at Norfolk, where he assisted the late Rev. Michael Waldron, beginning March 18, 1897. In August of the same year he transferred to a similar position at Sacred Heart parish in Omaha.

Illness during 1899 kept Father McNamara inactive for nearly five months, and in November he returned to Norfolk, this time as assistant to Rev. Thomas Walsh.

On August 13, 1899, he was appointed to St. Patrick's church at Jackson as assistant pastor, and on November 3, 1900, he became pastor at St. Andrew's church in Bloomfield. The church at Bloomfield then was a tiny mission.

The church building was a dilapidated frame structure without steps. The roof had been blown from the top, there were many broken windows. Father McNamara lived in a private home because there was no rectory.
Within two years work was

begun on a new church. Under his guidance the Bloomfield parish grew from a mission to one of the most important parishes in the Omaha diocese.
At Bloomfield Father "Mac," as he was affectionately known, was dean of the deanery comprising Boyd, Knox and Pierce counties.

When he left Bloomfield to come to O'Neill in 1934, he left the parish with a large, modern church, a parochial school and a fine rectory.

At St. Patrick's church here he succeeded the late Rt. Rev. M. F. Cassidy. He assumed the pastorate March 9, 1934. On November 6 in the same year he was elevated to right reverend. Investiture ceremonies were held here February 21, 1935.

Accompanying St. Patrick's pastorate were the titles of dean of the Boyd-Holt deanery and one of seven consultants of the diocese.

During his lifetime Monsignor McNamara twice visited Europe. In 1912 he toured all of Western Europe, he was granted an audience with Pope Pius X, and he attended the international eucharistic congress in Dublin, Ireland.

Survivors include: Sisters—Miss Mary McNamara, of Wisner and Mrs. J. J. Murray, of Omaha; brothers—Dr. R. B. McNamara, of Crofton, and George McNamara, of Beemer. One brother, Edward, died in July, 1949, and Monsignor McNamara attended the funeral.

The body was brought to O'Neill early last Thursday morning from Sacred Heart hospital at Lynch, where Monsignor McNamara had died late Wednesday night.

The remains were at Biglin Bros. until Saturday afternoon. Hundreds of persons visited the bier at Biglin's. At 1:30 p.m. Saturday the body was removed to St. Patrick's rectory and at 1:30 p.m. Sunday the remains were taken to the church, lying in state until after the funeral.

A rosary service was held Sunday evening, the church filled to capacity.

Out-of-towners began arriving in the city Sunday afternoon to attend the funeral.

The two-mile long funeral procession departed from O'Neill about 1 p.m. St. Mary's students lined North Fourth street as the procession left O'Neill, escorted by a state safety patrol car. There were 32 cars in the procession at the beginning, but others joined as it wended its way to Wisner on highway 275.

Interment was made in the Catholic cemetery at Wisner at about 4:15 p.m., beside the grave of the Monsignor's cousin, the late Rev. William McNamara. Burial was in a family plot.

Archbishop Bergan and his party arrived in O'Neill about 9:15 p.m. and departed ahead of the procession.

Edward Boyle Wins Trip to Chicago

Edward Boyle, of O'Neill, is among the 23 4-H champions who have been awarded trips to the national club congress in Chicago, Ill., from November 27 to December 2.

The announcement of the winners came Wednesday from the state 4-H club office at the University of Nebraska.

Boyle, a member of the Riverside club, was selected on the basis of his 1949 gardening project and was the Holt county champion in that field.

Bridget Boyle and Twila Whaley, both of O'Neill, were also selected state winners in their respective projects. Miss Boyle was chosen for her forestry project and Miss Whaley was chosen for the best frozen food project. They received awards from commercial firms or organizations.

Some 25 Holt county representatives were selected October 17 by the county 4-H committee. All contestants competed for honors on their records only.

FORMER O'NEILL RESIDENT DIES

Funeral services were held at St. Patrick's Catholic church Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock for John M. Horiskey, 70, of Cody, Wyo. Rev. C. J. Werner officiated at the rites and burial was in the Calvary cemetery.

The late Mr. Horiskey, a former resident of O'Neill, died Friday noon at his home in Cody, Wyo. He had been ill about one year and in bed one day when he died.

Born in Elkader, Ia., December 1, 1878, the late Mr. Horiskey came to Holt county when he was one-year-old and lived here until 1903.

On July 7, 1931 he married Ellen Oakley. At the time of his death he was employed as a watchman and for many years was employed in the lumber business at Cody.

Survivors include: widow, two brothers—M. H. and Walter, both of O'Neill; two sisters—Mary, of O'Neill and Mrs. Dorothy Blank, of Worland, Wyo.

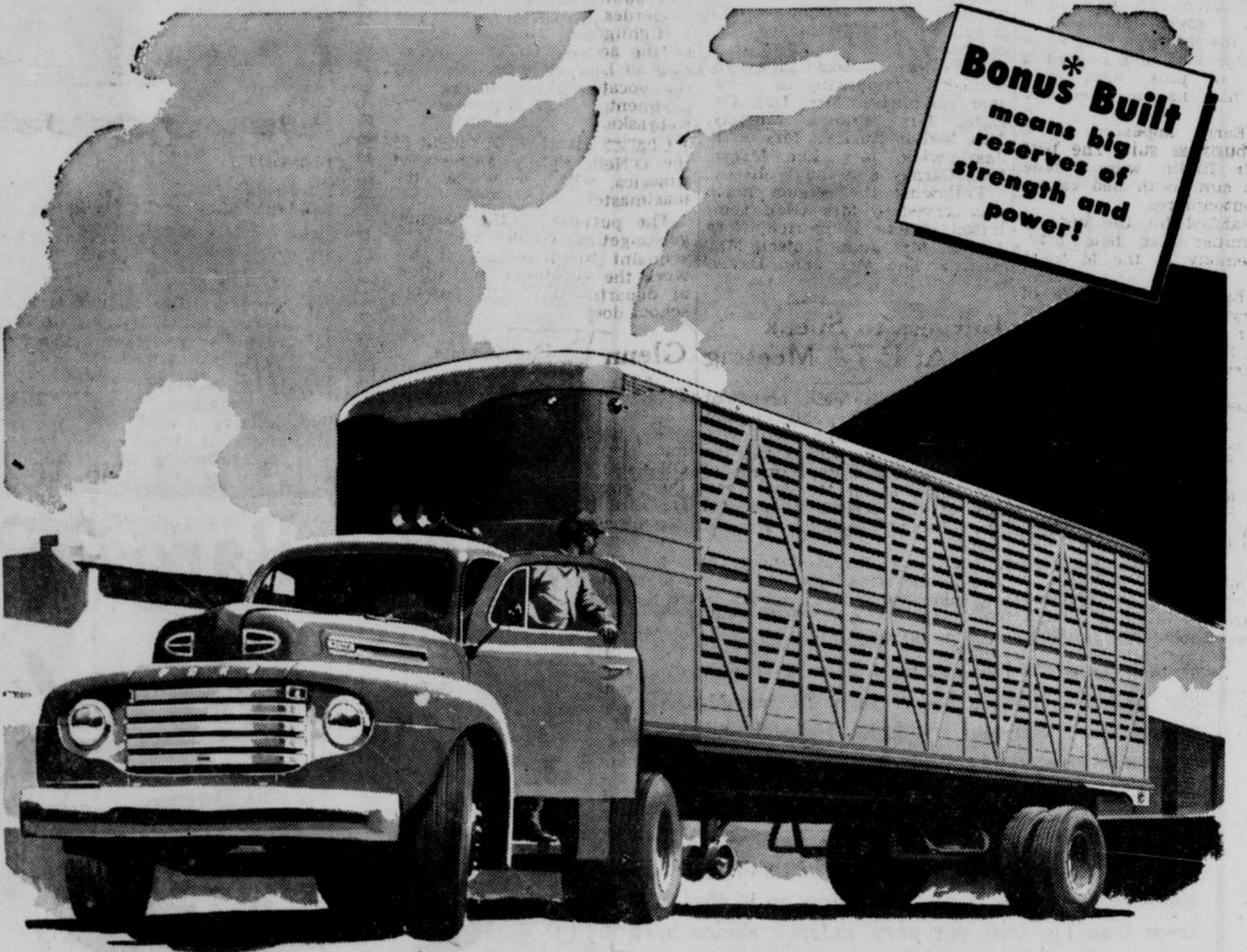
