Work on Highway 281 Slated for 1950

Reports from the governor's office in Lincoln through State Sen. Frank Nelson, of O'Neill, indicate there will be hard-surfacing work done on highway 281, North of O'Neill, during 1950.

James W. Rooney and James M. Corkle, both of O'Neill, conferred with the governor's office Saturday and confirmed the report that highway 281 will be subject to federal appropriation for bituminous mat, (oil), in 1950.

The work is to preferably start at the North end of the gravel at the Spencer-Lynch junction, then South to Midway. However, this working North to South on the highway will be subject to the will of the civic groups of towns along the route, both in Holt and Boyd counties.
