

Official Proceedings of the Holt County Board of Supervisors

O'Neill, Nebraska, Sept. 28, 1949, 10:00 A.M.
Holt County Board of Supervisors met as per adjournment. All members present.

Meeting called to order by the chairman.

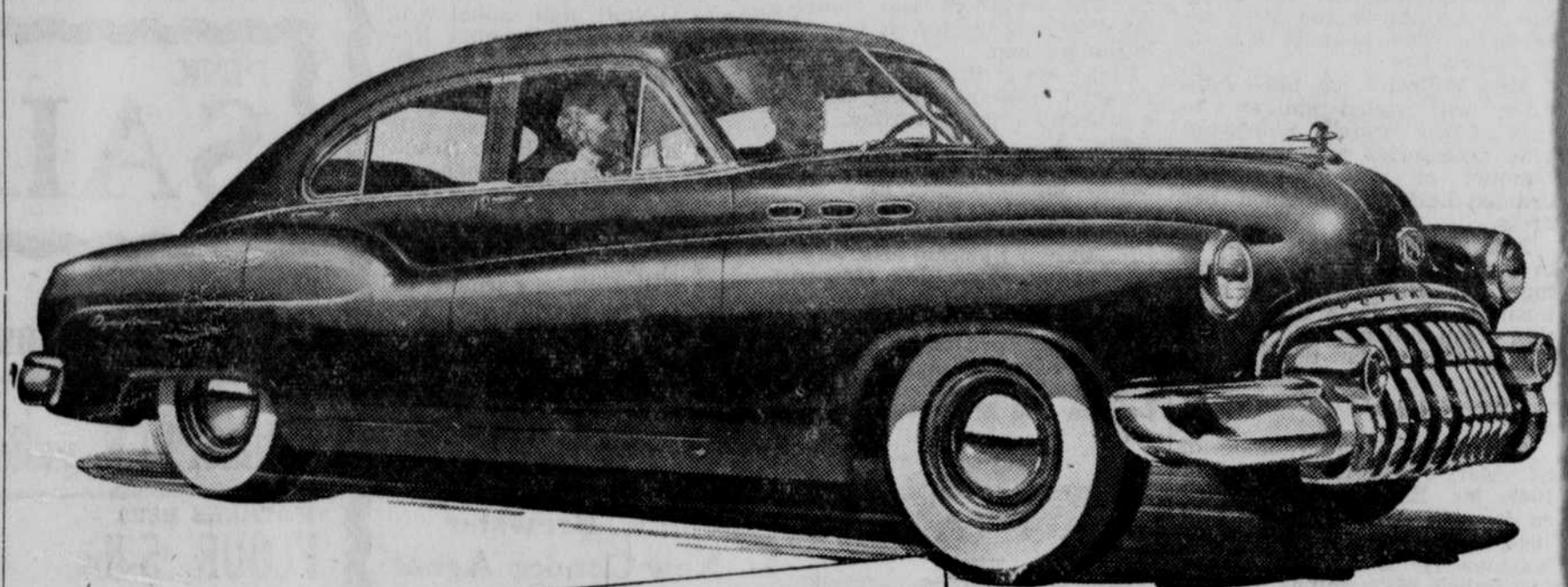
