Accreditation Meet Here Attracts 100

Over 100 teachers, superintendents and school board of education members from four counties attended a school accreditation meeting Tuesday night at the O'Neill public school, according to Howard Dean, principal.

Floyd Miller, of the state department of public instruction, explained the accrediting of the school and the factors involved.

Some of the major factors, the department of public instruction bases its classification of state schools on are: teacher qualifications and money spent per pupil; amount of money spent per pupil; the program offered.

Dean said the new law that went into effect in August took the accreditation of the state schools out of the hands of the universities and placed it with the department of public instruction.
