

6 Stacks Destroyed In Farm Blaze

Six hay stacks were destroyed late Monday in a blaze at the Mrs. Bessie Burge place, 9 miles Southwest of O'Neill.

Mrs. Burge and her son, Harold, were in town when the outbreak began. Another son, Clayton, was drawing stacks close into the buildings when he smelled smoke. Upon investigation he found ablaze the stack he was towing.

He desperately tried to move the blazing stack away from the others and was only partially successful. The flames spread to five others.

He blamed tractor sparks for originating the fire.

A general ring was sounded on the rural phone line about 4 p. m. and neighbors rushed to the scene. The O'Neill volunteer fire department was summoned and the fire-fighters succeeded in preventing further spreading of the flames.

It was 2 o'clock in the morning before the fire was completely under control. Absence of a strong wind is credited with preventing widespread damage. The stacks that burned were relatively close to the farm buildings and near a grove of trees. The cabling rack was charred. Twenty-six stacks in the vicinity were saved.

Mrs. Burge was in town during the ordeal — her son, Harold, having rushed home without locating his mother.

CHAMBER TALKS XMAS LIGHTING

23 Attend First in Series
of Noon Luncheons;
Back Scout Drive

Twenty-three members of the Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday in a noon luncheon.

The agenda was full, but the session ended promptly at 1:15 p. m. as scheduled.

Following the Slat's cafe meal, President Ruzicka brought the meeting to order. Minutes were read an approved.

F. E. Parkins and L. M. Diehlman, cochairman for the sixth annual farmer-rancher "stag" party, reported arrangements had been completed for the big affair to be held Monday, November 14, at the American Legion auditorium.

Plastic identification pins will be brought into use and Parkins asked that members preserve them for future Chamber functions. Names and firm names will be printed on the pins.

A discussion was opened regarding Christmas decorations in downtown O'Neill. It was decided that President Ruzicka should appoint a committee and the yule theme should be carried out in a decorative way.

In accordance with past customs the Chamber decided to maintain its Armistice day closing policy.

District Judge D. R. Mounts made a brief report on Boy Scout activity. The Scouts in O'Neill are sponsored by the Chamber and the American Legion.

Judge Mounts pointed out that a fund-raising campaign would be staged today (Thursday). The sum of \$1,800 is to be raised in order to meet the quota. This represents last year's and this year's quota, he pointed out.

Judge Mounts lauded the entire Scout program and attributed Scouting to be the best method to combat juvenile delinquency. He said he "faced juvenile problems in five counties" and he said Scouting "prevents many boys from becoming a problem".

Forty-four boys are now in Scouting in O'Neill, the Judge added.
