

BALERS WIN IN FINAL 2 SECONDS

Stowell Tallies Winning TD for Atkinson in 13-7 Thriller

SPRINGVIEW — A touchdown in the last two seconds of play brought Atkinson high its second win of the season as the Balers defeated Springview 13-7 at Springview Friday afternoon.

There were just 5 1/2 minutes to go when Atkinson took over on the Balers' 40-yard line. Sweeping the ends with laterals out to Stowell, the Balers picked up three first downs and found themselves, with 35 seconds of the game remaining, a seemingly impossible seven yards away from the touchdown they needed for the win.

They stopped the watch with time outs and in two plays were up to the 2-yard line. At this point the Hay Balers were penalized five yards for delay of the game; so it was fourth down and seven yards to go with just two seconds left.

In the most exciting two seconds of the whole Atkinson football season, Stowell drove over after a fake line buck. It was a hand-off, Small to Frisch to Stowell. Siebert made the kick good.

While Atkinson trailed until the final seconds of the game, the score is not quite indicative of the play, for after the first few minutes the play was all Atkinson's.

Springview received as the opening gun started the game and went on a sustained 50-yard drive until the Keya Pahans were held for three downs on the 6-yard line. However, a pass into the end zone was completed, and though Osborne hit it from the line of scrimmage, the ball fell from his fingertips into the hands of a Springview man. The extra point was run over.

For the remainder of the Atkinson continuously threatened, but it was not until the early part of the fourth quarter that Osborne blocked a Springview punt. Campbell fell on the ball on the 40 and in six running plays the Balers scored. Siebert's kick for the extra point was low, and with only eight minutes to go Atkinson trailed by one point.

There were four plays before Springview kicked and Atkinson took over to build up to the dramatic last second score.

The Balers made 10 first downs to Springview's 7, gained 185 yards by rushing to 130 yards gained in this way by Springview, and made a net gain of 85 yards by passing. The Springview team gained no yards by passing.

Eagles Top Neligh 12-6, Break Drouth

Calkins Gallops Off-Tackle 49 Yards for O'Neill's First Counter

The O'Neill high school Eagles won their first game of the 1949 season Friday night at Carney park by edging the Neligh Warriors, 12-6.

After a six game losing streak, the Eagles came and scored a pair of TDs on power plays through the weak side of the Neligh line.

Neligh had lost an identical number of contests and the Warriors, too, were out for the first win of the season.

Neligh won the toss and elected to receive. The Eagles held the visitors for downs inside the Warrior 30 following the kick off. Neligh punted to fleet Don Caulkins on the O'Neill 30. Caulkins returned the boot to his own 45 yard line before being hauled down.

On the third punch at the Warriors forward wall, Caulkins sliced over the week-side tackle and went 49 yards for the first six points. Caulkins attempted the point after touchdown kick, but the officials ruled the kick was wide.

After the kick off and two incomplete passes, Neligh booted to the Eagles. A long pass play to the visiting club's 16 was ruled complete because the Warriors were guilty of interference on the play.

On top of the interference, the officials inflicted a 15-yard penalty which put the ball on the Warriors 1-yard strip.

The tide turned however and the Eagles were guilty of backfield in motion on the first play, but lost the ball to the Warriors after three unsuccessful line bucks.

The first half ended with the Eagles out in front, 6-0.

When the third period was eight plays old, Layh faked to the wingback that was coming around and ripped over his own left tackle for 11 yards and the last counter. Again the extra point was wide.

After an exchange of punts in the third period, the Eagles lost considerable yardage and the Warriors came up with the leather on the O'Neill 20-yard strip.

Neligh counted a first and 10 on the 10 and then shot a spot pass for the touchdown. A pass for the point after touchdown was incomplete.

Three minutes remained in the game and the Eagles took the kick off and stalled the tilt out.

With the Eagles strong on pass defense, the Warriors were unable to exhibit any type of air offensive. The Warrior ground attack sputtered all evening and did not get underway.

Friday, November 11, the O'Neill high school Eagles take on the Atkinson Hay Balers in the final test of the season. Eagle Coach Marvin Miller said, "providing the weather is good, the game will be played under the Carney park lights. Otherwise, the contest will be shifted to an Armistice afternoon tilt."

SANDERS SPARKS EWING TRIUMPH

Tigers Gain Undisputed Hold on Cornbelt Loop Crown

EWING — The Ewing high school Tigers gained undisputed claim to the Cornbelt conference crown Friday by rolling over Newman Grove 51-0 on the loser's field. The Tigers extended their undefeated string to 15. They now have eight wins against no defeats this season.

Newman Grove took the opening kick-off and was forced to punt. On the first play from scrimmage, Ewing's Sanders ran for 75 yards and a touchdown. Four minutes later Pruden crashed over from the 7. With two minutes remaining in the period Sanders, behind perfect blocking, went 88 yards and the third score of the game. Pruden plunged for the point. Score at the half: Ewing 19, Newman Grove 0.

Sanders ran 329 yards and passed for 24 for a total of 353 yards.

Best for Ewing were Sanders, Pruden, Cloyd and Kurpege; best for Newman Grove were took the ball on an end sweep Stanley and Gotschall.

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CARDS ROUT SPALDING, 74-0

Seventh Straight Win For Jack Arbuthnot's Pupils

The Cardinals of St. Mary's bowled over their seventh successive opponent Friday at Spalding academy to the tune of 74-0 with the host team waving the white flag as the third quarter ended.

It was the second time in as many contests the Cardinal offense could have proved more embarrassing to opponents if it were permitted to continue to run.

Shorty Miles, fleet Cardinal halfback, ground out 36 points for the evening. It was the fourth contest out of the seven Miles has managed to score 30 points.
