

WAC Writes from Garmisch, Bavaria

(Editor's note: Pfc. Irenaeia E. Mullen, WAC, daughter of Mrs. Anna Mullen, of O'Neill, was employed as a telephone operator until she joined up with the Women's Auxiliary Corps a year ago. Private Mullen has gone to Germany, and the following letter describes occupation life—1949.)

Garmisch, Germany, October 1, 1949.

Dear Mom and all:
We arrived in Bremerhaven, Germany, on Friday, the 23d. We stayed at the staging area until Tuesday. We received our orders to go to Munich on Tuesday so left on the train. We had a wonderful trip.

This is the most beautiful country I have ever seen. Everything is set down in a certain pattern. It looks like a picture you would draw. They have all kinds of vegetable gardens and in each of them they have a little garden patch.

We are stationed at the 98th general hospital. Yesterday we went to work today, but we talked them out of it. We report on Monday. I think we are going to work in the children's ward. You have to "pull" night duty every two weeks so don't think I'm going to like that too well.

They have Sisters working in the hospital, and German girls who do all the dirty work, so can't see why these girls complain of being over-worked.

I hated it the first night we arrived, but think I will be better off when I get back to work.

Last night we arrived in Garmisch. It is a rest center for the GI's. I surely wish you could see this resort. It is surrounded by very high mountains and from the hotel there is a beautiful lake. It is the most beautiful thing I have ever seen. You should see the countryside. It is so very green and everything is in a certain order. Most of it looks like it was painted there.

We are taking a tour this afternoon of King Ludwig II's castle. He was the mad king of Bavaria.

The rooms are 50c a night and to eat in the mess hall is 10c. So you can see it is very cheap.

We went into town last night to a little German club. The music they play there is out of this world. They can play almost any piece, American or otherwise. I surely wish some of these would be musicians at home could show them how to play.

6,738 New Drivers' Licenses Issued

Holt county motor vehicle operators numbering 6,736 have renewed their drivers' licenses since September 1, according to county Treasurer J. Ed Hancock.

The Holt county treasurer said 7,389 licenses had been issued in 1947, the last time drivers were compelled by law to renew the permits.

Hancock thought the number of drivers in Holt county had "stayed about the same."

For those who failed to renew the licenses, Hancock said, examinations will be given on the first and third Saturdays of each month in the basement of the Holt county courthouse by a state highway patrolman. The deadline for the renewing the drivers' license was November 1.
