Twenty-seven members were present at the meeting held in Slat's cafe.

Mail delivery in the city was discussed. J. B. Grady reported that a postal inspector—G. C. Schoep, of Norfolk—was in O'Neill Tuesday making a preliminary survey of the city.

President Ruzicka appointed a committee, headed by Grady, to confer with Mr. Schoep.

Grady's committee, which includes H. J. Lohaus, Harry Peterson, Joe Stutz, John McCarville, D. H. Clauson, A. E. Woven and William Mcintosh, met early Wednesday with Mr. Schoep.

Schoep said that after a survey of the postoffice and town he felt the postoffice handled sufficient volume and the city had sufficient sidewalks to institute the door-to-door mail delivery for persons wanting that service.

But a manifestation of the citizens is needed before the service can be brought about, he told the committee. He urged the Chamber to conduct a door-to-door survey among persons living within two blocks South of Douglas street to determine the consensus.

Mail delivery would provide employment for one full time carrier and a substitute. Unofficially, the carrier would work the business district in the forenoon and the residential districts in the afternoons with only one delivery per day.

**Performance Report
Deadline Nears**

Time for turning in reports on performance on 1949 practices carried out under the 1949 ACP program closes on January 15, 1950. This was announced Monday by Harry E. Ressel, of O'Neill, of the PMA committee. Reports cannot be accepted after this date. Final notices have been recently mailed from the O'Neill PMA office.

"Reports not received on or before January 15, 1950, cannot be given consideration as our books are closed on that date and all funds that are available will be allocated. We also wish to call your attention that all commodity loans and purchase agreements on all small grains and grain sorghums must be completed by January 31, 1950, therefore applications should be made in this office about 10 days or two weeks before this date. However, loans on the 1949 corn crop will be available until May 31, 1950," Ressel stated.

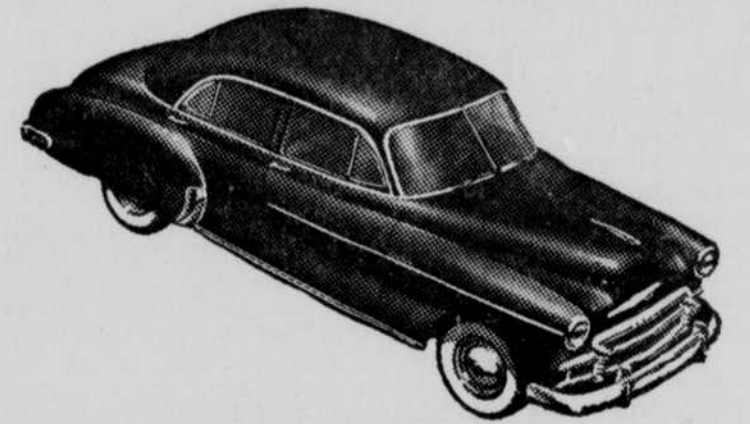
