ST. MARY'S DOWNS INMAN TEAM, 32-25

Valiant Visitors Unable to Cope with Card's Fast Pace

In their second meeting of the season Friday night, St. Mary's academy, of O'Neill, dropped a short but spirited Inman gang, 32-25. The game was played here.

With 35 seconds gone in the first period, the Cardinal center, Jack Gatz, hit a close-in jump turn shot and the Cards were never headed.

Guard Nielson, of Inman, sank a short push shot to tie the game. Miles and Gatz added a free throw apiece to push the count to St. Mary's 4, Inman 2. Hartigan, the hustling pivot man for Inman, swished a hook shot from the foul circle to tie up the tilt again.

Inman's diminutive Forward Stevens kept the contest from being a runaway, as he peppered the hoop for four buckets and a pair of free throws for a 10-point total. He walked off with high scoring laurels for the contest.

As the game advanced into the second period, Inman trailed, 9-11. Coach Jack Arbuthnot's pupils kept the fast pace and coupled their speed with good ball handling to lead at half-time 18-14.

Coach Darel Bright's lads had trouble in maintaining their uncanny, one-handed side court shots during the third canto. However, it was Stevens who was the big gun for Inman during that cold period.

Bright's "5" instituted a close, man-to-man defense at the outset of the fourth quarter. The defense held the Cards scoreless for 7 minutes and 15 seconds of the final period. Then they were only able to hit a fielder and a pair of free throws.

In the prelim, St. Mary's reserves dropped the highly-touted Inman reserves, 26-12. The Inman seconds had been undefeated in competition this cage season. John O'Neill, of St. Mary's, was high scorer with 9 points, while Sobotka hit 3 points for the Inman crew.
