A picturesque character has disappeared from the streets of O'Neill. Livestock buyers have left the streets and hunch up on a bench at the sale ring. Bill Fallon, George Bowden, Con Keys, Joe Cowperthwaite and some others bought many carloads of cattle and hogs that were marketed in town not to mention Fred Gatz and other meat vendors who did their own butchering.

There was a city scales, first located at Fourth and Douglas, with Gus Doyle weighmaster. Later it was moved East of the Gallagher store, and another weighmaster took over.

Buyers were not always satisfied with the weights the city scale showed and had loads of hogs weighed at the yards. This brought on bad feeling toward the buyers when the yard scales showed as much as 60 pounds less weight in a load of hogs than recorded at the city scales. This resulted in farmers taking their stock to other markets for a time but the local buyers got things adjusted so that the scales agreed and the livestock market boomed again in O'Neill.

I was one time a casual visitor in the home of an elderly English lady when a neighbor woman came in. The old English gal received her with all the apparent delight of a child with a new doll and was the gracious entertainer. As the neighbor left this gracious hostess slammed the door and turned on an indignant heel with a violent outburst, "Plague take the people!" Corn Acreage Allotments Being Established — Corn acreage allotments are now being established by the Holt county Production and Marketing administration committee for all old corn farms to be applicable to the acreage of corn planted for harvest in the crop year of 1950, according to Harry E. Ressel, spokesman for the committee.

Any farm producer on a farm on which no corn was raised in any of the years 1947, 1948 or 1949, and who plans to plant corn in 1950 may request a corn acreage allotment. This request must be filed in the county office in writing not later than January 31, 1950, if an allotment is subsequently to be established for such farms. Requests should be made to Holt County PMA committee, box 551, O'Neill. An allotment is necessary to be eligible for price supports.

At this time incomplete history on corn acreage for the past three years is being completed by community committee men.
