Interior of the house was completely remodeled and what had been a backporch was transformed into a bathroom. The house and farm buildings were wired for electricity and a 110-volt light plant was installed in a cement block house. Mental roofs were put on the farm buildings all of which were repainted. The yard was landscaped and an orchard

was planted. Wayne C. Whitney, of Lincoln, extension horticulturist at the University of Nebraska college of agriculture, helped judge the place, said it showed most improvements over any other farmstead in 45 Nebraska counties in the WNAX territory.

He summed up the Meusch's results with the idea "there's a lot of livin' on their place now that these changes have been made.
