## Steer Calves Top \$29.90 at O'Neill

Two hundred and forty cattle and 640 head of hogs were sold at the O'Neill Livestock Market Thursday, January 19. Butcher hogs brought \$16 to \$16.25 while cows cleared from \$12.50 to \$13.50 with feeder pigs ranging from \$17 to \$18.

Steer calves sold on a spread from \$23 to \$27 with a top of \$28.90. Heifer calves brought \$20 to \$25. Not many yearling steers were marketed, but those that were consigned and sold brought up to \$23. Fat cows sold up to \$16.
