Most of this number was drawn out by children and The lethal Card scoring teenagers. Books are purchased out of the library fund from seected lists drawn up by state and national authorities. Once a ear, oftener if convenient, the library is checked by one of these authorities personally and the board is advised of any changes deemed advisable.

The newest addition to the large selection of books is a set 1 14 of the Encyclopaedia Americana purchased on a monthly pay-1 17 ment plan. The National Geo-0 graphic magazine subscription 4 for the library was donated by 5 a citizen of Atkinson. Other 4 magazines are obtainable in the o same manner.
