O'Neill and Holt county residents this week bundled into their warmest winter clothing because the coldest seige of winter had struck.

The sharpest drop in tempgratures during the seazon came Satuday about noon. During the morning temperatures stood at a balmy, springlike 49 degrees. About 11 a. m. a cold front aided by strong winds moved in from the morth, the mercury tumbled and in little over two hours the temperature was zero. Lowest. Semperature recorded that might was -12.

There was a variance of 71 degrees throughout the week. Lowest reading recorded was -22 on Thursday, January 27, and the highest was posted on Saturday morning at 49.
