Consumers Install New Power Rate

Designed to Give Patrons In Respective Population Groups Same Rates

Consumers Public Power District, following standardization of residential, commercial and rural rates throughout the system last September which saves electric users served by the District over \$415,000 annually, has announced new standardized power rates which become effective June 1.

These new power rates will result in additional savings to commercial customers of about \$36,000 per year, and will be available to virtually all communities in the state-wide system.

Commercial Power Rate Reduction Achieves Standardization of Retail Rates.

Commercial Power Users Will Save \$36,000 Annually Throughout State-Wide System

Result of New Low Power Rates Announced June 1

Following Consumers policy of reducing rates whenever the operations of the District justify and in connection with the state-wide rate standardization program, Consumers Public Power District announced new low commercial power rates applicable June 1 for all communities in the state-wide system. The new power rates effect last September, which saves electric users throughout the state-wide system in excess of \$415,000 annually, are based on population brackets in the respective communities under the four power systems in the state. In addition to saving commercial power customers an aggregate of \$36,000 annually, the new power rates virtually achieve rate standardization throughout the state-wide system.
