Surviving the deceased are her husband, Alfred, and two children, Mrs. Burnita A. Wilson, Little Rock, Arkansas; Pvt. Harlan A. Dierking, U. S. M. C., Parriss Island, South Carolina; her mother, Mrs. Helena Kleemann, Snyder; five brothers, Perry, of Salinas, Cal.; Rudolph, of West Point, Nebr.; Earl, of Beemer, Leroy of Snyder, Ferdinand, of Scribner; one sister, Mrs. Hazel Coops, of Snyder, also a host of nieces, nephews and friends.

On June 12, 1945, she entered the Stuart hospital with a serious infection. On June 28 she was allowed to come home; on July 12 she was taken back to the hospital where, on July 15, at about 5:30 a. m., she passed away of a heart attack. Funeral services were held in St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Chambers, the Rev. L. A. Dale, pastor. She was buried in the Chambers cemetery. She was a devoted mother, a loving wife.

The pallbearers were: Walter Jutté, John Walter, Emil Leiswald, Jr., Frank Pierce, Levi Gilman and Vernon Sagesar.

On December 16, 1918, she was united in marriage with Henry Alfred Dierking at the Lutheran Church at Snyder, by Rev. Hoffmann. To this union were born two children, Burnita and Harlan.

On June 25, 1929, she was confirmed and received into full communion with St. Peter's Lutheran Church at Snyder, Nebr., by Rev. Paul Weinholt. On February 14, 1934, the family moved to Amelia, Nebr., and were accepted as members of the Lutheran Church of Chambers, Nebr.
