### Will Harvest Native Grass Seeds

Supervisors of the Holt Soil Conservation District are making plans to harvest native grass seed, according to Chairman, E. J. Revell.

The District Supervisors will pay farmers a certain rate per acre for the right to harvest the seed or would harvest the seed on shares. The rate to be paid will depend on the amount of seed set in the heads, the kind of grass, the thickness of stand, the kind and amount of weeds or weedy grasses and the size of the field.

Any farmer who has a field of any of the native grasses which he thinks would be suitable for harvesting and would be interested in having it harvested should drop a card to Supervisors Holt Soil Conservation District, Box 511, O'Neill, Nebraska, or contact one of the following Supervisors: E. J. Revell, Louis Bernholtz, David E. Bowen or F. E. Eves. Farmers may also leave word at the County Agent's Office or the Soil Conservation District office.
