O'Neill Native Dies in Denver—Funeral Today

Ralph Morris Millard was born in O'Neill, Nebr., June 4, 1895. He grew to manhood here and at the outbreak of World War I enlisted in the United States Navy in which he served twenty-six months. Upon his discharge from the service he came back to O'Neill to be with his parents. Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Millard, Holt county pioneers. Ralph cared for his parents until their passing three years ago. He then went to Denver to make his home with his sister, Mrs. Irvine Hughes. A week ago he suffered an attack of appendicitis and entered Fitzsimmons General Hospital at Denver.

His condition was critical from the start, and although he made a gallant fight and everything humanly possible was done for his recovery, he passed away Sunday morning, September 30.

Ralph leaves a host of O'Neill friends to mourn his passing besides his sisters, Mrs. L. B. Messacar of Omaha; Mrs. Irvine E. Hughes, Denver, Col.; and one brother, Fred Millard, of Omaha.

The body was shipped to this city and funeral services were held from the Methodist Church Tuesday, October 4, and interment in Prospect Hill cemetery.
