San Antonio District, AAFPC: First Lt. Harry H. Yocum, of O'Neill, Nebr., who served twelve months in the European theater of operations as a Pilot has arrived at the San Antonio District, AAF Personnel Distribution Command.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Yocum, O'Neill, Nebr.

Lieutenant Yocum wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with five clusters, and the European theater ribbon with three Battle Stars. He is credited with having shot down one me-109 enemy plane. He will spend approximately two weeks at the redistribution station undergoing records and physical processing in preparation for a discharge or reassignment to duty in this country.

During his stay here, this combat veteran who was assigned to San Antonio upon completion of a 30 day leave at his home, will be duty free and have at his command all of the many recreational and educational facilities made available to returned airmen by the Personnel Distribution Command.

Holt One Of Leaders In Salvage Collections

Returns have been received for the car of paper shipped on August 27. Checks have been sent to paper collectors in the county.

From June, 1944, to September 1, 1945, Holt county shipped 11 cars of paper, with a total weight of 399,420 pounds. Money received was \$3,283.20. With the exception of about \$375.00 this money was turned over to the churches, schools and organizations that collected the paper, and a small amount was used for trucking, and to pay boys who helped with the loading.

The \$375.00 was collected to be used for a Honor Roll in the county. It will be held for that purpose or to be added to some future fund for a war memorial in the county.

No more paper will be shipped by the Salvage Committee. However, paper is still needed and can be sold. Schools, churches and organizations who wish can still sell their paper at a good price.

The tin cans have been moved and cleaned up. No more will be picked up. Only about 13,800 pounds of tin was collected altogether. That was rather disappointing.

We wish to thank everyone in the county who helped with the Salvage Program.

People all over the county gave generously of their time to make this work a success. Mr. Matousek, Mr. Wolf and Mr. Hubbard, County Supervisors were especially kind in helping us out. Mr. Osenbaugh sent the State Trucks when needed and Mr. Kersenbrock, of O'Neill, was always willing to send the City Truck. To these men and to the people all over the county who helped we say, "Thank you again, you did a fine job. And we are all glad it is over."
