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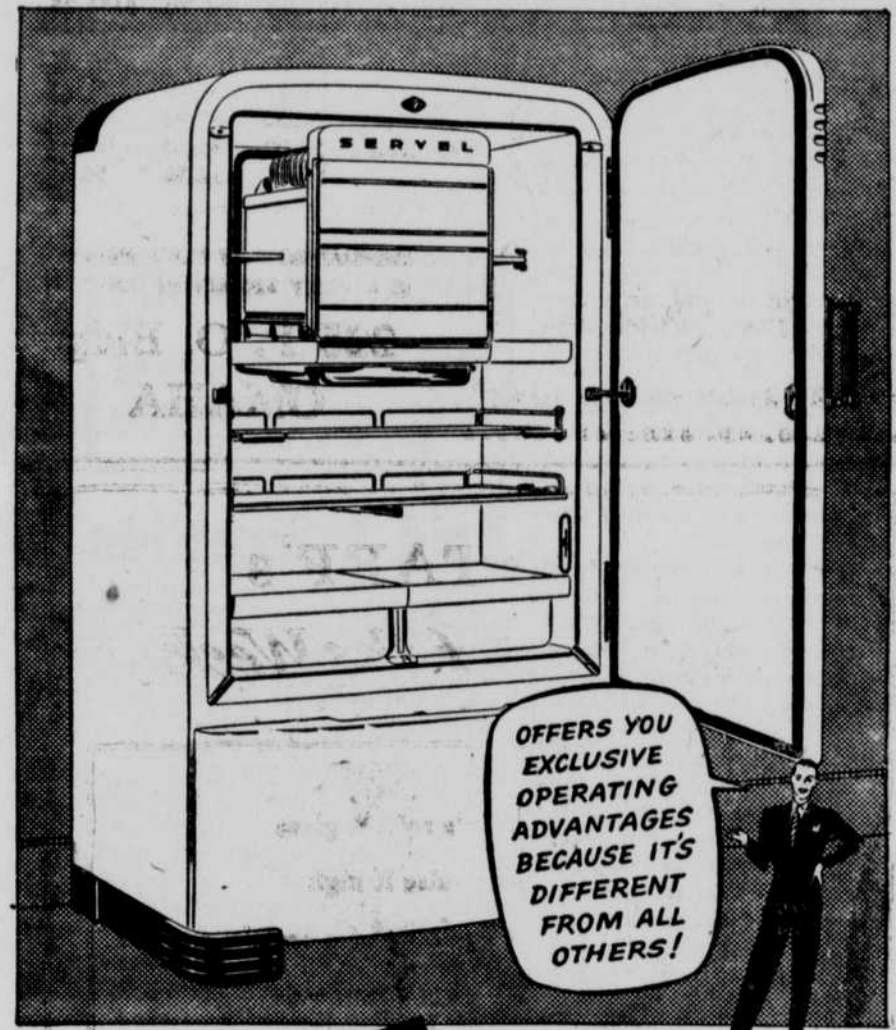
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O'NEILL HATCHERY

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NEWS FROM ARMY FRONTS

Fort Lewis, Wash.—Garold J. Wrede, O'Neill, Nebraska, was honorably discharged from the service, officials at the separation center have announced today.

Cpl. Kazimierz W. Sojka of Page, Nebr., is being released from the Army Air Forces this week. Cpl. Sojka is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sojka.

Cpl. Sojka's last assignment was with the Air Technical Service Command in the power plant division at Wright Field, Ohio.

He has been in the armed forces since May 5, 1942, and served in the Caribbean. He wears Am. Def. good conduct.

Before entering the Army, where he served as a carburetor mechanic Cpl. Sojka was employed by the American Steel Foundries of Indiana Harbor as a millwright helper.

Aboard the Escort Carrier USS Munda, Tokyo Bay—(Delayed)—Marvin G. Van Every, seaman, first class, USNR, O'Neill, Nebr., went ashore for liberty here with other crewmen of this ship after it had entered Tokyo Bay with the 3rd Fleet for the initial occupation of Japan.

During the final stages of the war, the Munda had been a part of the 3rd Fleet's logistics support group and had operated in the water off Japan. The ship's job was to provide the fast carriers with combat-ready pilots and planes to replace losses, so that the sustained strikes against the Jap homeland could be con-

tinued without let-up. Saipan, Marianas Islands.—Clyde McKenzie, 24, yeoman, second class, USNR, O'Neill, Nebr., is serving with the staff of the Military Government on this island, where thousands of interned civilians—Japanese, Koreans, Chamorros, and Kanakas—are living in camps under the government's supervision, nearly half of them children under 16.

During the invasion of the island, the civilian population fled from their towns and villages into the hills, where they lived in caves.

In the first days of the U. S. invasion of Saipan, a few civilians were captured by the invading forces and turned over to the newly-formed Military Government, which began its operations under hostile fire.

At the end of the campaign, thousands of civilians were induced to come down from the hills into the internment camp. Most were in poor physical condition by reason of long exposure, limited diet, and other conditions.

Now, a 500-bed hospital takes care of the internees' medical needs. The education program is being enlarged and 25 buildings are used for that purpose. Religious services are held regularly, with Catholic and Protestant services for the Chamorro and Kanake internees. A Buddhist priest conducts regular services for the Japanese and Koreans. Shintoism, the fanatical politico-religion of Japan is prohibited.
