Miss Cullen Returns to Nebr.

Army Service Forces, Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark, N. J.—After three years at the office of Dependency Benefits, in Newark, N. J., Mary E. Cullen has resigned to resume her work at Father Flanagan's Boys Town in Nebraska. This was announced by Brig. Gen. Leonard H. Sims, USA Director of the ODB—the largest activity of the Office of Fiscal Director, Headquarters, Army Service Forces. The ODB administers family allowances and Class E Allotments for the entire Army.

Miss Cullen was associated with Father Flanagan long before his Boys' Town won international fame through the moving pictures dramatizing the project and starring Spencer Tracy and Mickey Rooney a few years ago.

In 1913, while Miss Cullen made her home in O'Neill, Nebr., with her uncle, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. F. Cassidy, priest of the Diocese of Omaha, she met a young priest who had come to serve as assistant pastor in the diocese. His name was Edward J. Flanagan and this was his first assignment. Four years later he founded his now famous Home for Boys. In 1940, Miss Cullen became a member of his staff as manager of the Gift Shop and hostess to all visitors.

Since its founding in 1917 the home has become an incorporated village where homeless boys elect their own village executives and council, and manage their own affairs. The present settlement of 720 acres accommodates 400 to 500 boys between the ages of eight and eighteen, educating them through high school and qualifying them for college education.

Seven hundred of the boys trained by the Msgr. Flanagan served in World War II. Thirty-four of them were killed in action.

Miss Cullen, who spent most of her life in social service and parochial work in Nebraska, is a native of Elizabeth, N. J. She is the sister of Margaret Nell Cullen, Anna Cullen and Michael Cullen of 324 Livingston Street, Elizabeth, and of Peter Cullen of 132 Warren Avenue, Roselle Park, N. J.

At the ODB, Miss Cullen was a determination clerk in the examination section of a Class E allotment branch. She had the responsibility of directing a search of records and making the final determination in cases where Class E allotment forms, requesting some change in an allotment, fail to supply the ODB with full and exact information as to the allotter's intention. Accounts referred to her could not be authorized for payment until she had determined the facts and made the final decision as to the proper action to be taken.

In her three years at the agency Miss Cullen has witnessed its astounding growth as accounts pyramided rapidly, keeping pace with the expanding war-time Army. In November, 1942, 36,000 checks were mailed on behalf of 72,000 dependents of Army personnel. That was the first mailing. A year later there were more than three million checks going out from the huge agency each month and during the past year, with the war effort at its peak, the ODB mailed over eight million checks—amounting to half a billion dollars—on behalf of some 16 million dependents each month. Total disbursements to date amount to approximately 12 billion dollars, mailed in 207 million monthly checks. Exclusive of checks, the ODB has handled about 108 million pieces of mail. Average daily mail almost equals that of a city the size of Omaha.

Soukup Brothers Served Together in Army

Sgt. Leonard John Soukup and his younger brother, Sgt. Thomas Robert Soukup, sons of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Soukup, 445 N. E. 8th Ave., enlisted together in the Army Air Forces in October, 1942, and almost three years to a dot, received their discharges at Drew Field, Tampa.

During many periods of service overseas in various theaters, they were only separated one week. They returned to the States this spring from their last post, Ascension Island and telephoned their parents from Tampa Monday that they were "free men."
