S. Sgt. and Mrs. Dale Asher and son arrived from Kearns, Utah, Thursday. He has received his honorable discharge.

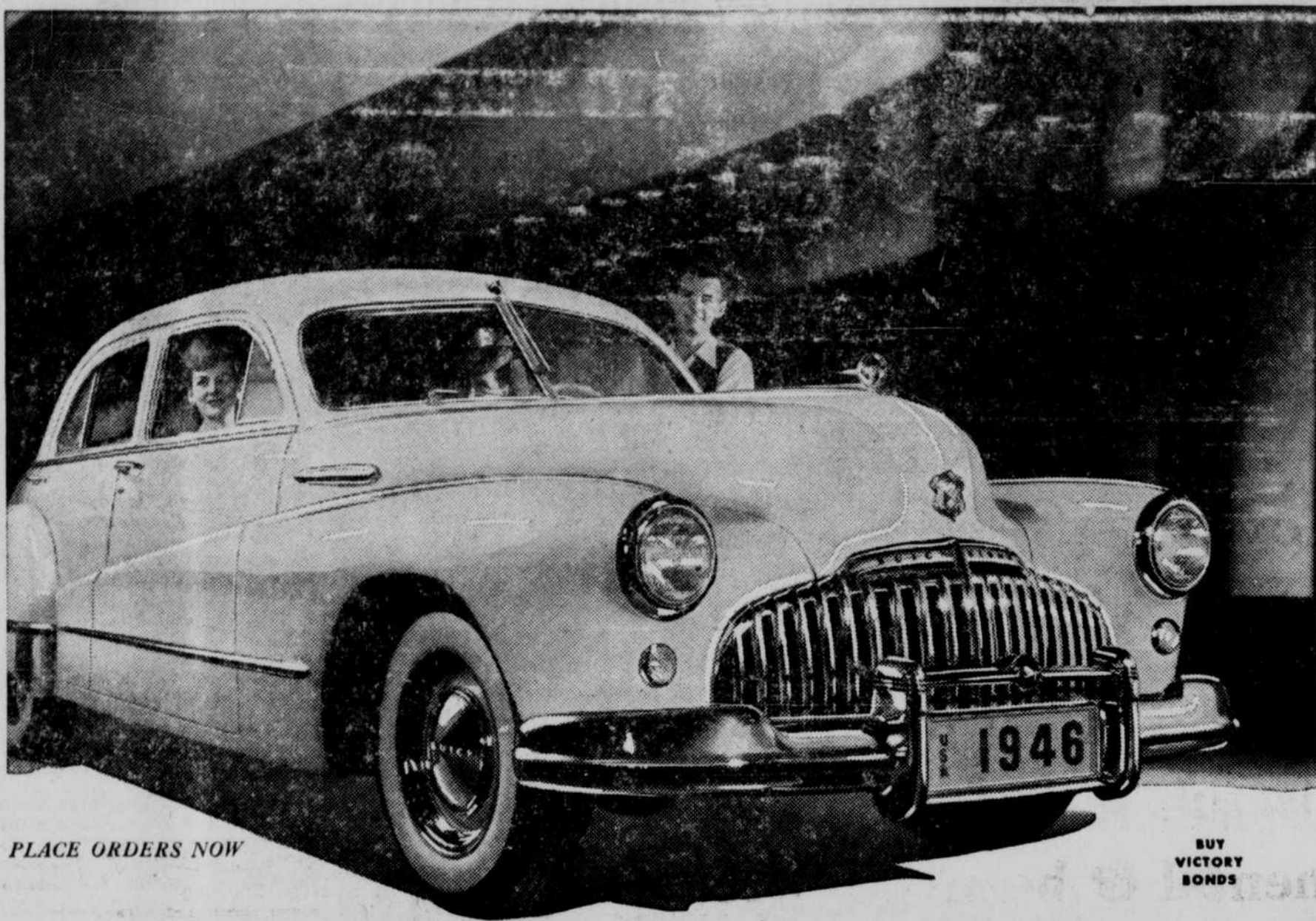
The Just-a-Mere Club met with Mrs. J. N. Carson Friday afternoon with ten members present. The afternoon was spent playing rook.
