

At their meeting on January 25 they approved conservation farm plans on the farms of Ben A. Miller, 11 miles east and 7 miles north of O'Neill; James Corkle, 2 miles east of O'Neill; Robert Carr, 5 miles west of Atkinson; Walter Ries, 5 miles east of Atkinson; Vernon Harding, 1 mile north and 4 1/2 miles east of Milway; and Paul Young, 2 miles east and 2 miles south of Opportunity.

They also approved applications for assistance from L. A. Ott, O'Neill; L. A. Whiting, Ewing; Wesley Sanford, O'Neill; Clifford Olson, Amelia; Tim Read, Chambers; and Charles, Keith and Percy Abart, Emmet.

Farmers interested in the program of the soil conservation district may receive information from the County Agent in the court house of the District office in the court house annex.
