




The C. L. C. Club met with Mrs. L. C. Rakow Friday a tennoon with eight members present. Mrs. Soren Sorenson was a guest.

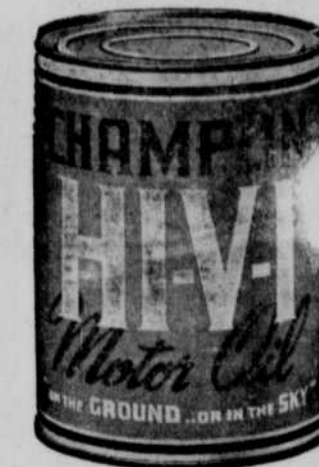
Asher-Stewart
