of Colorado Springs, Col.; Mrs.

Carpenter, of Chambers and one
son, Louis V. Carpenter, who
passed away in 1926. A nephew
and niece also made their homes
with the Carpenters for several
years.

Mrs. Carpenter joined the
Baptist church while quite young
and was always active in church
and community service. For
many years she was a member of
the Beaver Valley Woman's Club,
and took an active part in Red
Cross during World War I.

She leaves to mourn her pass-
ing besides her husband and
children, 17 grandchildren and 22
great grandchildren.
