**Skillful Darn**

A skillful darn is the disguise for small holes, snags, or worn places in wool clothes. Some of the important little secrets of successful darning are: Use a fine needle and short thread, long thread pulled back and forth across a tear or hole tends to stretch the darn out of shape. Use thread that blends with the material—preferably ravelings from the same cloth, or dull-finish thread of a matching but slightly darker shade. Remember, thread usually works up lighter than it appears on the spool. Darn on the right side, but steam-press the finished darn on the wrong side, then brush the right side to lift the nap.

**Close Vision**

With advancing age the lens of the normal eye also loses its ability for close vision. The point at which a person can read comfortably recedes until the time is reached when glasses are needed for reading. At 10 years a person can see fine print clearly at about 2 inches from the eyes. But at 30 years the average person cannot see print clearly at less than 6 inches. At 45 years the near point moves out to about 12 inches, and within a few years after many persons, without glasses, would have to hold a newspaper at arm's length!
