State Auditor Observes - - Some highlights of the year's operations

OUTLAW GROCERY

The Outlaw is still open for business in spite of the reports that are out all over Nebraska that the OPA had closed the Outlaw Grocery Store.

Yes, we were fined \$37.50 on May 15th for allegedly selling 78 cans of three different articles for a total overcharge of 90c, a trifle of over 1c for each article overcharge. There are a number of thousands of different articles and brands of goods handled in a grocery store. The OPA does not give us a listing on all brands. We do not believe there is a grocery store that could tag all of their goods without making some mistake. We know that if these three items were marked over OPA ceiling prices we did not mark these different articles over the OPA price intentionally.

We are not censuring the OPA board in O'Neill, as we think we have one of the best and fairest OPA boards in Nebraska.

However, on our case only, one OPA board member of the five members was present, the OPA District man, Mr. A. F. Shelby was also present. The one OPA board member and Mr. Shelby then appointed Mr. Tom Hannaberry, the janitor of their building, to serve with them. These three men gave us the fine or assessment of \$37.50 for the total overcharge of 90c. We were informed this case was the first case that Mr. Tom Hannaberry had been appointed to set in on.

We asked for a rehearing on this case in O'Neill but were flatly refused. We believe we should have had the right of a rehearing. We feel that over one Board Member of the five Board Members should be present for any business places' hearings.

Miss Arleen D. Shade, Chief Price Clerk, O'Neill, claims she got all of the evidence for this case. We were glad to hear that it was not one of our good customers.

After we received this assessment or fine of \$37.50, Mr. A. F. Shelby told us we had better pay the \$37.50 and not let this case go to the Omaha office for hearing as we would get a much larger assessment or fine there. We don't know yet if this was good fatherly advice or was meant as a threat.

You, our good customers, know that you can buy an order of groceries at the Outlaw for less money than at any other store in North Nebraska. The bulk of our goods are marked way under OPA ceiling. We know we make mistakes as with our large volume it is humanly impossible to give everything the attention it should have. We know there have been all kinds of wild reports out on the Outlaw. This is why we are running this ad to give you the facts of the case.

The Policy of the Outlaw Grocery is to undersell all other stores and to make right any mistakes we may make. We hope the Outlaw will still be left open for business.
