## 900 SIGNERS FOR 'RIGHT TO WORK'

Petitions for Amendment to Constitution Are Forwarded

#### FILED WEDNESDAY

O'Neill's petitions for the pro-posed "Right to Work" amendment were forwarded from here late Saturday and were filed Wednesday with hundreds of other petitions in the secretary of state's office at Lincoln.

The petitions, sponsored by the Nebraska Small Business Men's association, called for a vote on the proposed "Right to Work" amendment to the state constitu-

Excess Signers Many more signatures were secured throughout the state than required by law in order that the proposal may appear on the gen-

eral election ballot in the Fall.

Petitions were also circulated in Atkinson, Stuart, and other Holt county points, and were forwarded under the same procedure. The proponents of the "Right to Work" movement contend that the people can decide whether any organization-(referring to the labor unions)— can make a person pay out money in order to

get a job. C. D. "Neal" Haskell, of Laurel, headed the Nebraska Small Business Men's petition campaign committee.

### O'NEILL KEY STOP

The city of O'Neill will be officially represented when the Ne-braska Railway Commissionhears n amended application from the Civil Aircraft Service, of Lincoln, for permission to operate commercial and passenger service over three key intrastate routes.
The principal — and longest —
of these will include O'Neill as an important stop.

The city council Tuesday des-

ignated City Atorney William M. Griffin and Councilman Merle Hickey to attend the hearing on July 24.

Preliminary Hearing Held Preliminary hearings for the proposed intrastate air routes were begun June 24. The Civil Aircraft Service's number one route includes Omaha, Oakland, Wayne, Norfolk, Neligh, O'Neill, Ainsworth, Valentine, Gordon, Rushville, Chadron, Alliance and Scottsbluff. The number two route terminates at Omaha and Scottsbluff via Beatrice, McCook, North Platte and other points. The third route includes Omaha, Lincoln, Hastings, North Platte, Columbus, and Fremont, and other points.

Six weeks ago the Prairie Airways, Inc., filed application for intrastate passenger and freight service, and also included O'Neill on its route.

## REPRESENTATIVES Ray Siders Lauds Subsurface Tillage for Soil Conservation

Ray Siders, a farmer residing ? 23 miles northeast of O'Neill, now is a confirmed believer in subsurface tillage, because he has been conducting an experiment that has proved to his own satisfaction that subsurface tillage and crop residue management are the real Mc-

"This Spring I subsurface-tilled, or 'duckfooted,' as some call it, a field which was in its second year of sweet clover last year. There was quite a lot of trash and residue on the surface. I also built a terrace in this field with a moleboard plow," explained Mr. Siders.

"Shortly after I completed the tilling and plowing," he continued, "we had a good shower of rain. I went out to examine the field right after the rain and found that there was no water standing, and there was no evidence that any had accumulated or run off on the subsurface tilled land. However, on that which had been plowed for the terrace, the water had accumulated and run off.'

Mr. Siders said he had always thought that plowed land could absorb water more rapidly, but that this demonstrated to him that the subsurfacetilled land could absorb more water faster than plowed land.

Mr. Sider's practice is part of the conservation program which he has worked out for his farm with the assistance of the Holt county soil conserva-tion district. The terrace which he constructed with a farm tractor and plow is another. Other practices are contour-tillage, field diversions, seeding grasses for permanent hay or pasture, proper stocking of pastures, and tree planting.

The Holtdistrict has a subsurface tillage machine, which Mr. Siders used. It is available to cooperators in trying this method of tillage. Judging by the number of requests the district's supervisors have received for the use of this machine this Fall, they predict that this will be an increasingly popular method of tillage in Holt county.



#### ASSESSING DONE: VALUATIONS UP

The final tabulation of Holt county's 1946 assessing this week was completed, and will be forwarded immediately to the state tax commissioner's office. After early indications of a drop in valuations, forecast by what initially appeared to be a drop in the number of cattle in the county, the summing up showed a net increase in valuations of approximately \$197,000, according to County Assessor L. G. Gillespie.

This year, the total valuation in the county (xcluding franchises, railroads, class A and B intanggible property, and including valuations or all other real estate. tangible and intengible property) amounted to \$21,091,392, while last year's figures were nearly \$400,000 higher—\$21,480,320. The total value of intangible class A and B property in 1945 was \$1,975,210, as compared to \$2,-547,195 this year-a difference of nearly \$600,000.
