Sewer Extensions a 'Necessity'

Plans for O'Neill's long-needed improvements on its citywide sewerage system this week began taking definite shape as the city council ordered publication of a "resolution of neces-sity," which has been designed to familiarize the residents with the locations of the extensions and all the pertinent facts.

The proposed extension will cost an estimated \$65,221.00, to be financed by the issuance of 10-year sewer bonds. The plans call for 21 122 fort of dicht and call for 21,122 feet of eight-andten-inch sewer extension. Approximately 60 blocks wil be affected.

The resolution is being pub-lished in this issue of The Frontier.

The proposed program is the result of action taken by the recently-created municipal planning commission, which was appointed by Mayor F. J. Dishner under the provisions of a state law enacted in 1937 authorizing

The pro-gram includes "the securing of a new and adequate source of public water supply" as well as "the extension and modernization of our sanitary sewer system.'


