EWING- The Ewing citizenry Tuesday turned thumbs-down on a proposal to sell liquor by the drink by a decisive 139-95 vote in a spe-cial village election. It was the second time in seven years that the drink measure was rejected.

The proposition, as presented to the voters by the village board of trustees, after a petition had been circulated, read: "Shall the sale of alcoholic liquors, except beer, by the drink be licensed in . . . Ew-

Village Clerk Kermit Jefferies said that results "were not as decisive as the 1939 election." Jefferies said he did not believe that the polling Tuesday was a record for the town, but added that it was an "unusually heavy" vote.
