EWING REJECTS LIQUOR PROPOSAL

2d Time in 7 Years That Measure Beaten Decisively

EWING—The Ewing citizenry Tuesday turned thumbs-down on a proposal to sell liquor by the drink in a decisive 139-95 vote in a special village election. It was the second time in seven years that the drink measure was rejected. The proposition, as presented to the voters by the village board of trustees, after a petition had been circulated, read: "Shall the sale of alcoholic liquors, except beer, by the drink be licensed in . . . Ewing."

JOHN T. BIGLIN DIES AT HASTINGS

Heart Attack Fatal to Native of O'Neill; Funeral Here

John T. Biglin, 61, of Hastings, died early today (Thursday) in Mary Manning hospital in Hastings. Death followed a heart attack, which occurred several hours earlier while he was at home.

Funeral services will be held at St. Patrick's Catholic church here at 10 a.m. Monday, and burial will be made in Calvary cemetery in the Biglin family plot.

John Timothy Biglin was born in O'Neill on December 18, 1884, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Biglin, who were pioneer residents of O'Neill. He left here nearly 40 years ago. In recent years he had been connected with the Tri-County irrigation organization in south-central Nebraska.

Survivors include the widow, the former Etha Adams; three sons, John, of Salt Lake City, Utah; Richard, of O'Neill, and James, of Hastings; two daughters, Mrs. Albert Pohlmeier, of Lawrence, and Mary, of San Francisco, Calif.; four sisters, Sister M. Eugene, of Sioux City; Sister M. Calista, of Chicago, Ill.; Mrs. F. N. Cronin, and Miss Genevieve Biglin, both of O'Neill; three brothers, Ambrose, of Casper, Wyo.; Frank and William J. Biglin, both of O'Neill.

Moisture Deficiency Nearly Three Inches

September was ushered in with a three-inch deficiency in rainfall. The deficiency mounted steadily during the critical July and August growing period.

The drought, however, has not been as severe here as in regions west and east of Holt county.

A shower that netted 1.0-inch, Tuesday gave early indications of a break in the dry spell, but by midday the skies had cleared. Meanwhile, a flash flood netted only 1.59 inches of moisture in Omaha but it caused a small washout 3 1/2 miles west of Irvington, on the Northwestern system, and delayed Tuesday's westbound train number 13 over three hours.
