St. Marys Snaps Victory String for Unbeaten North Platters

GRAB 14-POINT LEAD

After a gruelling two-hour session with St. Patrick's of North Platte here Sunday, stock in the St. Mary's Cardinals soared to a new high. The reason: the Cards had surprised themselves, stunned their visitors, and upset virtually every prediction by squeezing out a 26-25 victory over a previously unbeaten North Platte outfit. The game was played in Athletic park here before a fair-sized crowd.

The Omaha World-Herald, which had ranked St. Pats in third position in Nebraska six-man grid competition prior to Sunday's fiasco, later termed St. Mary's win as the weekend's No. 1 upset in prep circles.

The Cards blitzed the visitors during the first five minutes, rolling up two touchdowns and a safety before St. Pats had fastened their headgear, and from then on it was a nip-and-tuck battle with the Cards producing in the pinches and the visitors valiantly trying to do something about it.

Outscore Opponents 200-40
The melodrama began the day before when the Green-and-White rolled into town on the crest of an impressive, all-victorious record, in which they had amassed 200 points to their opponents' 40. St. Agnes of Alliance had scored 13 points against the Platters—the most opposition the Green had had thus far. Bedded down comfortably in the Golden hotel after a 250-mile junket, the Platters were in anticipation of an easy Sabbath afternoon.

Reversals at the hands of Chambers, St. Mary's of Grand Island, and Sacred Heart of Norfolk had completely obscured the Cards in the heap of state six-man aggregations.

The Cards flashed an offensive in the early minutes that jarred their own waterboy. Two lightning drives, which totaled only seven scrimmages, and the Cards had chalked up two touchdowns and a safety.

The fat St. Mary's lead melted when the Platters partially recovered from the initial blows. They loosed a barrage of passes and romped through the center of the Cards line to score once in the second period, twice in the third, and finally moved into a



25-20 lead early in the fourth. The Greens' highscoring Halfback Bill McGovern led the attack.

Interception Turns Tide
Late in the fourth McGovern flipped a pass that was intercepted by O'Neill's Halfback Jerry Tomjack, who took the oval on his own 10 and raced it to the Platters' 15, where he was brought down from behind. Next play, Tomjack skirted his own right end and bounded across safely thanks to a perfect block thrown by his mate, Halfback Shortly Miles. The try for point failed, but the Cards were in front 26-25. With 4½ minutes remaining, the Cards stalled for time and the Platters took to the air but couldn't produce another tally.

Miles' vicious blocking and tackling was outstanding. The St. Mary's band and pep club entertained at intermission.

LEGAL NOTICE OF MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 5, 1946

(BALLOT TITLE)

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

AN AMENDMENT to Section 6, Article VII, of the Constitution of Nebraska, relating to free instruction in the common schools, so as to require that the legislature shall raise revenue for the schools from sources other than real property tax in a sum of not less than forty dollars (\$40.00) per pupil in average daily attendance, and to provide for the distribution thereof among the school districts of the state.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA: That Article VII, Section 6, of the Constitution of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

"Education being essential to the rights and liberties of the people and to the welfare of the state, the Legislature shall provide for the free instruction in the common schools of this state of all persons between the ages of five and twenty-one years, and shall raise revenue from sources other than a tax on real property, in a sum of not less than forty dollars (\$40.00) per year per pupil attending the common schools of this state, the number of pupils to be determined as being the average daily school attendance for the previous school year. The fund thus created shall be distributed annually among the several school districts of the state by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. This sum shall be distributed as follows: (1) Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each pupil in average daily attendance in the schools, (2) two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to each school district whose tax levy in mills for the previous year is the average or more for school districts of its class as provided by law, but in no event shall any portion of this two hundred dollars (\$200.00) make the aid provided by this Section greater than one-half the previous year's current operating costs, (3) the remainder of the sum shall be distributed to school districts as the Legislature may direct to equalize educational opportunity in the state."

LEGAL NOTICE OF MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 5, 1946

(BALLOT TITLE)

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

AMENDMENT to Constitution of Nebraska relating to and prohibiting denial of employment to any person because of membership or non-membership in or resignation or expulsion from a labor organization; prohibiting any contract to exclude persons from employment because of membership or non-membership in a labor organization; defining "labor organization" as any organization of any kind, or any agency or employee representation committee or plan, which exists for the purpose, in whole or in part, of dealing with employers concerning grievances, labor disputes, wages, rates of pay, hours of employment, or conditions of work; providing that said amendment be self-executing.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA: That the Constitution of Nebraska be amended by the addition of the following article:

SECTION 1.
"No person shall be denied employment because of membership in or affiliation with, or resignation or expulsion from a labor organization or because of refusal to join or affiliate with a labor organization; nor shall any individual or corporation or association of any kind enter into any contract, written or oral, to exclude persons from employment because of membership in or non-membership in a labor organization."

SECTION 2.
"The term "labor organization" means any organization of any kind, or any agency or employee representation committee or plan, which exists for the purpose, in whole or in part, of dealing with employers concerning grievances, labor disputes, wages, rates of pay, hours of employment, or conditions of work."

SECTION 3.
"This article is self-executing and shall supersede all provisions in conflict therewith; legislation may be enacted to facilitate its operation but no law shall limit or restrict the provisions hereof."

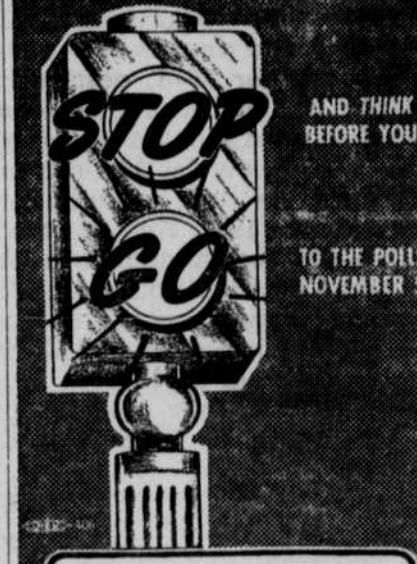
Communists Rap 4 Congressmen

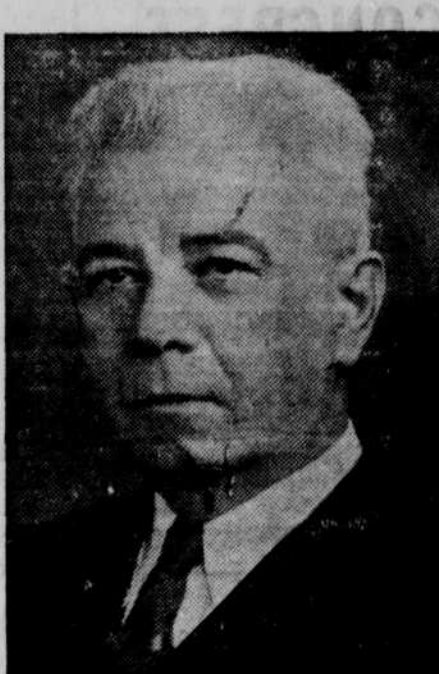
